2	(The hearing began at 12:27 p.m.)
3	JUDGE SEYER: All right, let's go on the
4	record. Today is September 11th, 2024. The
5	time is 12:25 p.m. My name is Ken Seyer. I am
6	the regulatory law judge with the Missouri
7	Public Service Commission, and I will preside
8	over this hearing.
9	The Commission has set this time for a
10	local public hearing to give members of the
11	public a chance to comment about Liberty's
12	general rate increase application, which is
13	commission file number GR-2024-0106.
14	The Commission regulates the rates charged
15	by public-utility companies in Missouri to
16	ensure that those rates are just and
17	reasonable. The Commission also regulates the
18	quality of service and safety of operations of
19	public utilities. There are five
20	commissioners. They are appointed by the
21	Governor and confirmed by the Senate. The
22	Commission employs a staff of engineers,
23	accountants, attorneys, financial analysts and
24	other specialists in the field of utility
25	regulation.

1	With me here today to my left is
2	Commissioner Maida Coleman, and, online, we
3	have Chair Kayla Hahn and Commissioner Jason
4	Holsman. The commissioners have not made any
5	decisions in this case and cannot answer
6	questions today because they have to remain
7	impartial until after all the evidence is
8	presented at the evidentiary hearing in this
9	matter that is scheduled to take place next
10	month. At this time, would the commissioners
11	like to make any opening remarks?
12	COMMISSIONER COLEMAN: I would, Judge.
13	JUDGE SEYER: All right, Commissioner
14	Coleman.
15	COMMISSIONER COLEMAN: Thank you, Judge.
16	I'd like to say good afternoon to everyone here
17	and to thank those who have come with questions
18	that you posed, I take it, in the previous
19	meeting that started at noon but also those who
20	have signed up to testify today to give us
21	information.
22	Please know that we have other
23	commissioners online that are listening in to
24	this hearing who will also be taking into
25	consideration your comments today. I'd like to

1	also thank those who have traveled here from
2	across this state, not only those with the
3	company and those customers that are here, but
4	also our staff and others that are present. We
5	thank you for your attention to today's hearing
6	and, again, appreciate you being here.
7	JUDGE SEYER: Would any other
8	Commissioners like to make opening remarks?
9	All right. Hearing none, there are attorneys
10	here today representing the parties in this
11	matter. For the record, would each of you
12	identify yourselves and state which party
13	you're representing? And I'll begin with the
14	utility.
15	MS. GRUBBS: Thank you, Your Honor.
16	Jermain Grubbs, I'm appearing on behalf of
17	Liberty Utilities Midstates Natural Gas
18	Corporation doing business as Liberty, thank
19	you.
20	MR. STACEY: Scott Stacey and Tracy
21	Johnson. We represent Staff at 200 Madison
22	Street, Jefferson City, Missouri 65101.
23	MS. MARTIN: My name is Anna Martin, and I
24	am an associate counsel with the Office of the
25	Public Counsel.



Τ	OUDGE SEYER. Okay. The way we will
2	proceed today will be to call the names listed
3	on the sign-up sheet in order that you signed
4	up, and there are two people on the list today.
5	When I call your name, please step up to the
6	microphone. I will place you under oath and
7	ask that you state and spell your name, then
8	you can offer your comments to the Commission.
9	We will try to limit comments to five minutes
10	per person.
11	Once you are finished with your comments,
12	if you'll remain at the microphone in case
13	there are questions from the commissioners or
14	the attorneys for the parties. So, first name
15	on the list is Rhonda Council.
16	(Rhonda Council sworn.)
17	JUDGE SEYER: Could you spell your name
18	for the record?
19	MS. COUNCIL: Rhonda, R-h-o-n-d-a.
20	Council, C-o-u-n-c-i-l.
21	JUDGE SEYER: All right, proceed with your
22	comments.
23	MS. COUNCIL: Okay, I'm here as a
24	consumer, but also I work in the City of
25	Sikeston, so we posted this information on our



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1	Page 6 Facebook page; and we did get a few comments on
2	our Facebook page, so I will read some of those
3	comments; and I will hand them to whoever needs
4	to get them after the meeting.
5	Some of the comments we got were, "Like
6	stuff isn't expensive enough.
7	Look at this crap.
8	This is bad for people on fixed income. We
9	don't get a raise.
10	Thank God I have all electric.
11	I have never understood why the consumers
12	should pay for technology improvements designed
13	to make the company more profitable. That
14	should not be our burden.
15	I hope someone who could attend the
16	meeting brings up not being able to take care
17	of business in person. Having to go through
18	the website is a difficult process for us that
19	don't have access to internet or having to call
20	a number that is not connected.

I have to work on the 11th at noon. Please voice my opinion as I vote no. This is a ridiculously high increase when they are making a profit.

JUDGE SEYER: Commissioner Coleman has a 18 19 question for you. 20 COMMISSIONER COLEMAN: Thank you, 21 Ms. Council, for coming today to give us this 2.2 information. You said you worked for the City 23 of Sikeston, also? 24 MS. COUNCIL: Yes. 25 COMMISSIONER COLEMAN: What's your role

4	I do want to also assure you that we have not
5	made up our minds. You know, I do know that
6	that would be the thought that people would
7	have because you're dealing with a utility
8	company, and many people feel that they can get
9	no assistance when it's them against the
10	utility company. But please be aware that we
11	five commissioners who will make this decision,
12	will take into account all of the issues
13	regarding this case, and I just want to thank
14	you for being here today. We appreciate it.
15	MS. COUNCIL: I appreciate that, and on
16	another note: back in 2018, we had this same
17	discussion. I was probably the only one here
18	to voice my opinion on that one, and the rate
19	increase still happened. So, that's why I made
20	that comment I just made.
21	COMMISSIONER COLEMAN: Thank you. I
22	appreciate your information.
23	MS. COUNCIL: You're welcome.
24	JUDGE SEYER: Do any of the other
25	Commissioners have any questions or comments



1 for Ms. Council? 2 COMMISSIONER HOLSMAN: No questions, 3 Judge. Commissioner Holsman. 4 JUDGE SEYER: Okay, thank you, 5 Commissioner Holsman. All right, Mr. Cohen. 6 MR. COHEN: Good afternoon. 7 JUDGE SEYER: Good afternoon. Would you 8 raise your right hand and be sworn today? 9 (Paul Cohen sworn.) 10 JUDGE SEYER: Thank you. And your name? 11 Paul Cohen, P-a-u-l, MR. COHEN: 12 C-o-h-e-n. 13 Okay. Where do you reside? JUDGE SEYER: 14 I live here in Sikeston. MR. COHEN: Okay, go ahead. 15 JUDGE SEYER: 16 I was noticing, and I brought MR. COHEN: 17 this up in the thing, the open question, the 18 rate increase for Southwest Missouri Region 19 is -- the percentage is higher than the rest of 20 the state, and this is the poorest area, 21 especially south of here, in the State of 2.2 Missouri with limited resources for people to 23 get the jobs, good-paying jobs. It's a lot of 24 farming. And I just wondered -- just don't 25 think it's fair that we have to pay more down

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here with less choices. I'm also on a fixed
income, and I do not agree with this raise or
rate increase. This year my income went up \$28
a month, but by the time my home homeowner's
insurance, my car insurance hit, I was in the
hole after that.

So, every penny does count. Thank goodness I do have a wife that is working. She also worked for a community action agency for 13 years here in town, helping people with their utility bills, and we are just right above the threshold where we can't get any help. And it's semi-curious that there are certain people -- I know she said there's certain clients that come in and got help constantly. But I just don't think it's right, as Rhonda said, for the consumers to have to pay for the increase so the stockholders can get their return better.

And I do feel like, as she does, sometimes the minds have been made up. I know that's not the case, as Ms. Coleman said. I hope this increase does not pass; or, if it does, just a very little, and the rate increase here is not -- it's not more than what it is up north.



1	And I appreciate everybody's time coming out
2	here and listening. That's all I can say.
3	JUDGE SEYER: Okay.
4	COMMISSIONER COLEMAN: Thank you.
5	JUDGE SEYER: Do any of the commissioners
