2	(The hearing began at 6:48 p.m.)	
3	REGULATORY LAW JUDGE SEYER: All right,	
4	let's go on the record. Today is November 4th,	
5	2024. The time is 6:50 p.m. My name is Ken	
6	Seyer, and I am a regulatory law judge with the	
7	Missouri Public Service Commission, and I will	
8	preside over this portion of tonight's hearing.	
9	The Commission has set this time for a	
10	local public hearing to give members of the	
11	public a chance to comment about	
12	Missouri-American Water Company's application	
13	for a general rate increase for water and sewer	
14	service, which is Commission number file	
15	number, or it's Commission file number:	
16	WR-2024-0320. The Commission regulates the	
17	rates charged by public utility companies in	
18	Missouri to ensure those rates are just and	
19	reasonable. The Commission also regulates the	
20	quality of service and the safety of the	
21	operations of public utilities.	
22	The Commission is composed of five	
23	commissioners. They are appointed by the	
24	governor and confirmed by the Senate. The	
25	commissioner employs a staff of engineers,	

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1	Page 3 accountants, attorneys, financial analysts and
2	other specialists in the field of utility
3	regulation. To my right tonight is
4	Commissioner Jason Holsman, and joining us
5	online is Chair Kayla Hahn and Commissioner
6	Maida Coleman.
7	The commissioners have not made any
8	decisions in this case and cannot answer any
9	questions today because they have to remain
10	impartial until after the evidence is presented
11	at the evidentiary hearing scheduled to begin
12	February 27th of next year. Commissioner
13	Coleman, at this time would you like to make
14	opening remarks? Commissioner Holsman, sorry.
15	COMMISSIONER HOLSMAN: Thank you. Good
16	evening. On behalf of Chairwoman Kayla Hahn
17	and the entire commission, we want to welcome
18	you to this. We know there are many things you
19	could be doing. It's a stormy night. I don't
20	know if your Google or your Apple Maps took you
21	someplace else, but I know mine did so it was
22	difficult to find. But you're here. We know
23	you can be doing a lot of other things, kick
24	off for the Chiefs is in a half hour so you
25	could be doing that, but you're here to share

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1	Page 4 your thoughts with us. As the judge mentioned,
2	we can't answer any questions, but we haven't
3	made any decisions and so your testimony is
4	important and we do appreciate it, so we
5	welcome you to this local public hearing.
6	Thank you.
7	REGULATORY LAW JUDGE SEYER: Thank you,
8	Commissioner. There are attorneys here today
9	representing the parties in this matter, and
10	for the sake of the record, would each of you
11	identify excuse me, identify yourselves and
12	state which party you're representing?
13	MS. NIEMEYER: Sure. Good evening.
14	Rachel Niemeyer on behalf of Missouri-American
15	Water Company this evening. The court reporter
16	has our address. Alongside me is our Vice
17	President of Operations, Jody Carlson. We
18	appreciate you being here tonight. This is a
19	very important part of the process, and we're
20	glad you're here. Thank you.
21	MR. PRINGLE: Hi, my name is Travis
22	Pringle, and I am the attorney for the staff of
23	the Missouri Service Commission. Our contact
24	information is also on file with the court
25	reporter.



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1	Page 5 MR. CLIZER: John Clizer representing the
2	Missouri Office of the Public Counsel. My
3	contact information is in the record as well.
4	REGULATORY LAW JUDGE SEYER: All right,
5	thank you. The way we will proceed with this
6	portion tonight will be to call the names of
7	the people that have signed up on the list in
8	the order you signed up. And I'm looking at
9	three names on the list. When I call your
10	name, I'll ask you to come up to the microphone
11	and I'll ask you to state and spell your name
12	and then I'll place you under oath and you can
13	then give your comments to the Commission. We
14	will try to limit comment to five minutes. And
15	once you've given comments, if you can remain
16	at the microphone in case there are questions
17	from the commissioners or the attorneys for the
18	parties, I would appreciate that. So, the
19	first name on the list is Austin Rose.
20	MR. ROSE: Good evening.
21	REGULATORY LAW JUDGE SEYER: Good evening.
22	(Austin Rose sworn.)
23	REGULATORY LAW JUDGE SEYER: Please state
24	and your spell your name for the record.
25	MR. ROSE: Austin Rose, A-u-s-t-i-n,



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1	Page6 R-o-s-e. And am I ready to give my comments?
2	REGULATORY LAW JUDGE SEYER: Yeah, and if
3	I could ask you this, where what service
4	area, and do you receive water or sewer
5	service.
6	MR. ROSE: I see I receive water from
7	Missouri-American Water. I use the City of
8	Joplin for my sewer and trash.
9	REGULATORY LAW JUDGE SEYER: Got you.
10	MR. ROSE: All right. So, I am against
11	the proposed rate hike, or at least in the
12	terms of quantity they're asking. The
13	34 percent increase in the rate would be really
14	damaging for people and their fixed income and
15	low income specifically. People who are
16	struggling nowadays across the board and now
17	more than ever, a rate hike of this magnitude
18	would just really put people in a very
19	unfortunate position. There seems to be a lack
20	of transparency, at least currently in the
21	pricing structure of the projects that the
22	public have benefited from. I'm very curious
23	as to the efficiency and the effectiveness of
24	the projects and their expenses. I respect
25	that 1.5 billion has been spent or will be

1	spent, although I'm also very curious if the
2	timeliness of that was a factor or whether or
3	not some of it was spent a bit prematurely.
4	Regardless, I'd certainly be a proponent
5	of adjusting that rate hike over a longer term
6	to make it more manageable than taking such a
7	severe hike so so soon. Additionally,
8	there's public health and safety concerns. I
9	understand that there is a list of improvements
10	needed to be made and that's always going to be
11	the case. I think that it's important to have
12	really solid utilities and water quality, but
13	that should not be at the cost of our
14	resident's livelihoods. You've had significant
15	past rates (sic) in the past and this just
16	continues adding on to that. I understand that
17	rates will probably consistently rise, although
18	the rate at which they increase can certainly
19	be managed.
20	And then, finally, with the economic
21	timing, inflation's as high as it's ever been.
22	People's wallets are stretched tighter than
23	ever and I know I'm not the only one feeling
24	it. And I find it highly irresponsible to ask
25	for a such high increase and for such a

1	short time. Additionally, I'd look for higher
2	increase in, like, efficiency and effectiveness
3	and making sure that funding is used properly
4	instead of just wastefully. And, additionally,
5	if there's any sort of funding through the IRS
6	government grants not IRS, EPA or anything
7	along those lines, I'd be highly advocating for
8	the use of those funds rather than the increase
9	of customer rates. Thank you.
10	REGULATORY LAW JUDGE SEYER: All right.
11	Commissioner Holsman, do you have
12	MR. ROSE: Oh, actually, can I have one
13	more thing?
14	REGULATORY LAW JUDGE SEYER: Sure.
15	MR. ROSE: And you mentioned a lower rate
16	for 150 percent of the federal poverty line,
17	which is laughable. The federal poverty line
18	is \$15,000 for a person of one; 150 percent of
19	that is just over 20,000. So, a full-time
20	person working \$10 an hour would be who
21	would qualify for that, which I don't know
22	around the room who here is working for \$10 an
23	hour, but that makes all of us not qualified
24	for that reduced rate, so the assumption that
25	this will suddenly be beneficial for people on

2	economic need, there are going to be a lot more	e
3	people struggling than that 150 percent of the	
4	poverty line. So, I want to put that as well,	
5	though.	
6	REGULATORY LAW JUDGE SEYER: All right.	
7	All right, thank you. The next name on the	
8	list is Justin Gill. Mr. Gill, would you raise	e
9	your right hand?	
10	(Justin Gill sworn.)	
11	REGULATORY LAW JUDGE SEYER: Could you	
12	state and spell your name for the record?	
13	MR GILL: My name is Justin Gill,	
14	J-u-s-t-i-n; last name, G-i-l-l.	
15	REGULATORY LAW JUDGE SEYER: Okay. Go	
16	ahead.	
17	MR. GILL: My name is Justin Gill, and I'r	n
18	the president of a local nonprofit called the	
19	North Heights Neighborhood Group. It is a	
20	little community in north Joplin over here by	
21	Main Street. We represent, or at least help	
22	serve in that area, about 2500 households of	
23	different mixed incomes, and we have two	
24	thousand people on our Facebook Group, and we	
25	promoted this and talked about this a little	



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1	Page 10 bit as a community. And one of the things that
2	we just want to voice to the Commission is,
3	that it was pretty universal across our entire
4	neighborhood of 2,500 households that this
5	would be a very untenable increase in cost for
6	them. That many of them are low income
7	families and households and that a consistent
8	increase in their utility bills is one of the
9	major burdens that they face as a family here
10	in Southwest Missouri. And that we would want
11	to voice to you as people who are trying to
12	build relationships and rebuild aspects of our
13	community, that we would want to voice to you
14	the burden that a consistent increase of 15 to
15	30 percent on a particular utility bill has on
16	a family in this area. So, we just wanted to
17	let you know.
18	REGULATORY LAW JUDGE SEYER: Okay, thank
19	you. All right, and there's one final name on
20	the list, but I cannot make out the last name
21	so, yeah. Yes.
22	(John Franklin Ockert sworn.)
23	REGULATORY LAW JUDGE SEYER: Would you go
24	ahead and state and spell your name?
25	MR. OCKERT: Yes, my name is John Franklin

2	REGULATORY LAW JUDGE SEYER: All right, go	
3	ahead.	
4	MR. OCKERT: I stand in negation of the	
5	current rate increase as it stands. I would	
6	request that they reevaluate the percentage	
7	that is being requested, especially when it	
8	comes to those who are using water, the natural	
9	resource, in a conservative manner. Those seem	
10	to be hit with the highest percentage of a rate	
11	increase. I believe that they need to	
12	reevaluate their proposed rate increase, so the	
13	heaviest users, whether that be people with	
14	bigger homes, pools, nondrinking or palatable	
15	water usage, such as irrigation, those folks	
16	and entities pay the biggest percentage of the	
17	increase and not the bottom line.	
18	I also would like for the Commission to	
19	evaluate the profitability of the company and	
20	perhaps they dip into their profits and	
21	dividends to help offset the cost onto the	
22	consumer, us the citizenry. And that's it.	
23	REGULATORY LAW JUDGE SEYER: All right, is	
24	there anyone else who did not sign up but you	
25	would like to testify? All right. If yes?

18	comments, it's not always easy to get up in
19	front of a mic in front of your peers and say
20	how you feel; but it's welcome and appreciated
21	and we'll just we'll judge the case the best
22	we can and make an objective choice and we'll
23	see you guys next time.
