2	JUDGE FEWELL: We can go on the record. Good
3	afternoon. It is December 10, 2024, and the current
4	time is 12:55 p.m. The Missouri Public Service
5	Commission has set this time for a local public hearing
6	to give members of the public a chance to comment about
7	the application in File No. EA-2024-0302, which is
8	captioned as In the Matter of the Application of Ameren
9	Transmission Company of Illinois for a Certificate of
10	Convenience and Necessity under Section 393.170.1, RSMo.
11	relating to Transmission Investments in Northwest and
12	Northeast Missouri.
13	The Missouri Public Service Commission
14	regulates investor-owned utility companies in Missouri
15	and ensures that rates are just and reasonable. The
16	Commission also regulates the quality of service and the
17	safety of the operations of investor-owned utilities.
18	The Commission is made up of five Commissioners: Chair
19	Kayla Hahn and Commissioners Maida Coleman, Jason
20	Holsman, Glen Kolkmeyer and John Mitchell.
21	Hello. Can you mute your microphone until
22	addressed. Thank you.
23	The Commissioners are appointed by the
24	Governor to fixed terms and confirmed by the Senate.
25	The Commission employ a staff of engineers, accountants,

1	Page5 attorneys, financial analysts and other specialists in
2	the field of utility regulation. With me today are
3	Chair Hahn, Commissioner Coleman, Commissioner Holsman
4	and Commissioner Mitchell all on line with us.
5	Commissioners, if you have any questions at any time,
6	feel free to interrupt me and ask them.
7	COMMISSIONER KOLKMEYER: Judge, this is
8	Commissioner Kolkmeyer. I'm here as well.
9	JUDGE FEWELL: Commissioner Kolkmeyer is also
10	here. So all five of them are here today. My name is
11	Riley Fewell, and I'm the Regulatory Law Judge presiding
12	over this hearing. This is an official hearing of the
13	Public Service Commission, and the statements and
14	testimony of witnesses will be recorded by the court
15	reporter and must be given under oath or affirmation.
16	The Commission has not made any decisions in
17	this case. Neither the Commissioners nor myself can
18	answer any questions about the issues in the case today,
19	because the Commission must remain impartial until after
20	all of the evidence is presented.
21	As we want to provide all attendees an
22	adequate opportunity to speak today, we will limit the
23	testimony to only three minutes. If you or someone you
24	know would like to make additional comments, there's a
25	consumer comments tab that can be reached via the
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1	Page6 Commission's website psc.mo.gov and on the right side of
2	the home page there's a link titled submit comments.
3	Click on that link to submit your comments, and make
4	sure that you reference this Case No. EA-2024-0302.

5 The court reporter is transcribing this 6 hearing so the Commission may review and read the 7 comments. Commissioners, would you like to make any 8 opening remarks?

9 Thank you, Judge. CHAIR HAHN: Happy to. 10 Thank you all for being here today. Really appreciate 11 your attendance over this lunch hour. We are continuing 12 our hearing from last night with this virtual WebEx. 13 Some of you may have also participated in the hearing 14 from last evening and may have additional comments that 15 you would feel more comfortable offering in this format. 16 So we look forward to hearing from you.

17 If you've never done a WebEx hearing before, 18 just raise your hand virtually or say that you would 19 like to participate. And even if you wouldn't like to 20 participate necessarily in this hearing, you can always 21 submit written comments. And those are really important 2.2 especially in cases like this. So we look forward to 23 hearing from you and thank you so much for your time. 24 Thank you. JUDGE FEWELL: And to unmute 25 yourselves, if you're not aware, it is star 6. We also

2	comment as well. I'll try to keep in order as best I
3	can.
4	Would the parties like to make an entry of
5	appearance beginning with Ameren?
6	MR. KUMAR: Thank you, Your Honor. Jason
7	Kumar spelled K-u-m-a-r, on behalf of Ameren
8	Transmission Company of Illinois. Our business address
9	is 1901 Chouteau Avenue, C-h-o-u-t-e-a-u, St. Louis,
10	Missouri 63103.
11	JUDGE FEWELL: Thank you. For the Commission
12	staff.
13	MR. VANDERGRIFF: Good morning. I'm Eric
14	Vandergriff, and our address is 200 Madison Street,
15	Jefferson City 65102, representing staff.
16	JUDGE FEWELL: Thank you. And the Office of
17	Public Counsel.
18	MS. MARTIN: My name is Anna Martin. I am an
19	associate attorney with the Office of the Public
20	Counsel, and I do believe that our address is on record.
21	JUDGE FEWELL: Thank you. And are there any
22	intervenors present who would like to make an entry of
23	appearance? I think Clean Grid Alliance is here.
24	MS. PIONTEK: This is Emily Piontek with Clean
25	Grid Alliance, but I'm not an attorney. I'm just

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JUDGE FEWELL: For those who would like to
provide comments today, I'm going to call the names. I
don't have a sign-up sheet, but if you can raise your
hand or write into the chat that you'd like to speak.
I'll also be watching if anyone has their video on and
raises their hand physically. I think there's a raised
hand tab/button that you can click on as well and let me
know. And when I call your name, please unmute
yourself. I will then place you under oath and ask you
to state and spell your name for the court reporter.
Then you can offer your comments to the Commission.
As I previously stated, we are limiting
comments to three minutes so that everyone has an
adequate chance to be heard. Please remain after your
remarks until you've been excused, because the
Commission may have questions for you and the attorneys
may as well.
Is there anyone who would like to make a
comment? I don't have a list it doesn't look like.
Actually think, Mr. Mark Harding, I want to say that you
had reached out to us about making a comment.
MR. HARDING: Okay. I'm here.
JUDGE FEWELL: Can you state and spell your
name for the record?



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1	MR. HARDING: Yeah. Mark, M-a-r-k, Harding,
2	H-a-r-d-i-n-g.
3	JUDGE FEWELL: Will you raise your right hand.
4	Do you solemnly swear or affirm that the comments you're
5	about to give are the truth?
6	MR. HARDING: I do.
7	JUDGE FEWELL: Thank you. You may proceed.
8	MR. HARDING: Good afternoon, Commissioners.
9	It's a nice opportunity to have you all here. My
10	concerns lie in the rerouting of what was called the
11	original DO 27 when it got rerouted. How it was
12	rerouted, why it was rerouted is the concerns. So
13	that's an overview.
14	I want to draw your attention I submitted a
15	couple of documents. So if you would look at the
16	exhibit that I presented, Schedule JND1, page 25 or page
17	29 of 54, if you have that. Should I proceed?
18	JUDGE FEWELL: Yes.
19	MR. HARDING: It lists in the testimony three
20	bullet points reasons for the reroute. And then drawing
21	your attention to page 21 in the direct testimony, which
22	I provided for you also as an exhibit, in that
23	particular place Mr. Nichols uses two reasons.
24	I'd like to go through those a little bit and
25	make you aware of some things. If you look at the only



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1	place that the the place where there's mention three,
2	which is in this JND1 schedule, page 25, the third one,
3	the third bullet point where it says proximity to newly
4	constructed residences north of 46 Highway identified by
5	landowners at the public meeting. And then drawing your
6	attention to the third exhibit which is the photo on
7	page 47 of 54. It's a photo of Google Earth with newly
8	constructed residences labeled there. If you see that.

9 That is the picture in the testimony of the 10 ones mentioned north of 46 Highway. I just want to make 11 sure that everybody is clearly aware that those two 12 houses that drew attention in the testimony had at the 13 time of the DO 27 route, they had 1,250 feet of 14 clearance to each of them. That's important to note 15 because in the reroute it impacts other houses at about 16 half of that distance a little bit less. So I wanted to 17 make you -- make sure that all Commissioners are aware 18 of that fact.

19 I apologize. I was kicked out JUDGE FEWELL: 20 for a moment of the WebEx. Can you repeat what you said 21 the last couple of minutes. I know you're probably 2.2 going from memory or just discussion. I'm sorry. Ιt 23 kicked me out. It's a technology thing. 24 MR. HARDING: Okay. I'm not sure where I

1	JUDGE FEWELL:	Pa You had just picked up the m	age11 ap.
2	I apologize about that.		

3 MR. HARDING: I was talking about the three 4 bullet points that are mentioned in one location and the 5 two bullet points that are mentioned in another and then 6 for documentation of the third bullet point where it 7 says proximity to newly constructed residences north of 8 46 identified by landowners. Then there's the map 9 associated with the entries that I made, and that 10 clearly shows the residences that are in question.

I wanted to make sure it was clear to all the Commissioners that those residences at the time had 1,250 feet of clearance from the line and the reroute provided about half that distance to another residence depending on which line you go with, maybe more than one, but the reroute imposes on people much more than that.

18 So then I want to go back to the other two 19 reasons that were given to justify the reroute, because 20 my whole idea is why did there need to be such a drastic 21 It became apparent to me that if you look at reroute. 2.2 bullet point number one on both of the documents, it 23 lists the USDA regulated hog farm. I wanted to give you 24 some background and some information about who and what 25 that is and whether or not that is property that needs



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1	to be avoided because it does not need to be avoided.
2	There are power lines on it. You can access that.
3	Ameren needs to know that they can use that property to
4	put power lines on. They weren't in close proximity to
5	buildings, which is what confused me from the beginning.
6	It was just that the DO 27 was along the road of
7	property that is owned by them and who is them, the USDA
8	pig barn is Smithfield Foods. That is a Chinese owned
9	large company. It happens to be the Chinese company
10	that owns some 80 percent of all US ag land that is
11	owned by Chinese in this country. So they're a very
12	large conglomerate.
1 0	The the sheet was easted in the shift of

13 That's who that property is. It's a little 14 bit insulting to some landowners here whenever you read 15 that oh, we need to avoid this particular property when 16 you know it's Smithfield Foods and you're wondering why 17 they're getting such prejudicial treatment. So I sought out to find out more about that and I contacted 18 19 Who did I talk to? I talked to the Smithfield Foods. 20 person who's in charge of environmental there. He had 21 no knowledge of the line.

I wanted to find out who provided the feedback that allowed them to use it as a good reason to reroute because it didn't make sense to me. He assured me that he didn't know anybody. He checked up the chain.

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1	Page 13 Bottom line is I can't find anybody that provided any
2	information to Ameren, and I've asked Ameren themselves.
3	I've asked them who provided you this information, are
4	you getting good information, because I know they're not
5	getting good information in other areas. So they won't
б	tell me who it is, if you're interested. I just wanted
7	you to know who that is when they're using that as a
8	reason.

9 To me, we've already disqualified the 10 residences north of 46 Highway as a reason to reroute 11 because they already had the 1,250 feet. Then we've 12 eliminated USDA pig barns, because it's just not true. 13 You can go on there. It is a minor inconvenience, I'm 14 told, but it's not a place you can't go for a line.

15 Then you look at the actual legitimate reason, 16 the third one, a residence located near this location 17 If you see that third one there, known as on Kent Lane. 18 that is a legitimate concern because the highline was 19 too close to that property. They did reroute for that. 20 That would be a simple fix compared to a major reroute 21 to accommodate these three points or two points, however 2.2 you want to look at it.

I'm trying to figure out why the necessity to make such a major reroute and left the planned mapped area and imposed on, who happens to be my daughter's



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1	Page 14 family's house so closely when it wasn't justified to
2	begin with. I just wanted to make you aware of those
3	things.
4	JUDGE FEWELL: Thank you for your comments,
5	sir.
6	MR. HARDING: Thank you.
7	JUDGE FEWELL: Is there anyone else who would
8	like to make a comment today? I don't see any raised
9	hands. Okay. Is that Dane?
10	MR. JUSTICE: I'm sorry. No. I'm kind of
11	just I'm pondering on my own over here. I have
12	things that I would like to say. I'm not sure if
13	they're eloquent enough to be put on record as of right
14	now.
15	JUDGE FEWELL: Okay. I appreciate that. We
16	have, again, the written comment section. I'll
17	re-reiterate the path to get to that as well. And then
18	I think Mr. Kleinschmit, I saw that you had raised your
19	hand as well.
20	MR. KLEINSCHMIT: More along the lines of what
21	Dane said.
22	JUDGE FEWELL: Okay.
23	MR. KLEINSCHMIT: I mean, there's some
24	disgruntlements with Ameren. It is more along the lines
25	of what Dane said.

1	Page 15 JUDGE FEWELL: Okay. Again, I appreciate your
2	candor in that, the both of you. Again, feel free
3	especially to write out your thoughts especially if you
4	think you can do it more eloquently with more time to
5	consider what you'd like to say. Regardless, we
6	appreciate your presence today as well. Caller user
7	number 9, do you have a comment to make as well?
8	MR. JUSTICE: Sir, I have a question real
9	quick. Will we be able to add to this hearing at the
10	end?
11	JUDGE FEWELL: I can come back to you if you
12	want to take some time. If other people have comments,
13	yeah, I can come back to you and ask if you'd like to
14	make verbal comments. Otherwise, it would need to be
15	we won't have another local public hearing. It would
16	need to be through the comment.
17	MR. JUSTICE: I understand. I'm just trying
18	to force my words to come together.
19	JUDGE FEWELL: Sure. Again, it may be better
20	to write them down. That may be an easier method then.
21	It looks like there are no additional comments. Would
22	any Commissioners like to make any closing remarks?
23	MR. TURNER: Can you take comments from the
24	phone?
25	JUDGE FEWELL: Yes, sorry. Caller number 9,

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1	Page 16 yes, we can. I'll take your word for it. Can you raise			
2	your right hand so I can swear you in?			
3	MR. TURNER: I'm raising my right hand.			
4	JUDGE FEWELL: All right. Do you solemnly			
5	swear or affirm the comments you are about to give are			
6	the truth?			
7	MR. TURNER: Yes.			
8	JUDGE FEWELL: Can you please state and spell			
9	your name for the record.			
10	MR. TURNER: Randall Turner. That's			
11	R-a-n-d-a-l-l T-u-r-n-e-r.			
12	JUDGE FEWELL: What would you like to tell the			
13	Commission?			
14	MR. TURNER: Well, first of all, I find that I			
15	don't even know where this is going. I've received two			
16	letters. And I'm participating in this call with the			
17	hope of finding out where you're planning on this going.			
18	I went on the website and I see what appears to be at			
19	least a five-mile wide block is the only thing showing			
20	where it might go near my farm. So seems like there's a			
21	lack of communication.			
22	Also, putting 345 kV lines over property has			
23	negative influences up to 1,400 feet wide if you try to			
24	get below .5 milligals, which is the recognized EMF			
25	limit. I don't know that any of that's been discussed.			

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1	Page 17 The last item is I think I read that it's 25			
2	feet high to the low point of the line with a 14-foot			
3	high combine and a 10-foot safety margin, which is			
4	safety margin for high voltage lines. I find that to be			
5	awfully close.			
6	JUDGE FEWELL: I appreciate your comments and			
7	I understand, sorry for the frustrations that you're			
8	having with that with confusion and things.			
9	Mr. Kleinschmit, have you raised your hand			
10	again? Are you wanting to make a comment now?			
11	MR. KLEINSCHMIT: Yes, I have. Something else			
12	I thought of, if you're calling on me.			
13	JUDGE FEWELL: Will you raise your right hand.			
14	MR. KLEINSCHMIT: Yep.			
15	JUDGE FEWELL: Do you solemnly swear or affirm			
16	that the comments you're about to give are the truth?			
17	MR. KLEINSCHMIT: Yes, I do.			
18	JUDGE FEWELL: Can you please state and spell			
19	your name for the record.			
20	MR. KLEINSCHMIT: Joshua Kleinschmit,			
21	J-o-s-h-u-a K-l-e-i-n-s-c-h-m-i-t.			
22	JUDGE FEWELL: You may proceed.			
23	MR. KLEINSCHMIT: My concerns tie to			
24	Mr. Turner's. Ameren only contacted us to purchase our			
25	land. They never contacted us to ask us how this would			



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1	Page 18 affect us. To go also on Mr. Turner's comments with the
2	map, it's very vague. It is not detailed at all. There
3	might be a few words in there. But the picture is vague
4	and it's blown up. It's not detailed on where it's
5	going to go on which way the transmission lines are
6	going to go. And then my concern is also for the
7	25-foot height and health problems for us being out
8	there, because we're actively out there multiple times
9	throughout the course of the year. What if in the
10	future somebody wants to build on there, you know. Then
11	that takes everything out of it, because my land is very
12	closely related to the substation and it looks like they
13	want to put multiple lines coming out when there's
14	already multiple lines coming out of the existing
15	substation as it is. Those are my concerns.
16	JUDGE FEWELL: Thank you for your comments.
17	Dane, I think you've raised your hand again as well.
18	MR. JUSTICE: Yes, I have.
19	JUDGE FEWELL: Can you raise your right hand
20	and I can swear you in?
21	MR. JUSTICE: Yes, sir.
22	JUDGE FEWELL: Do you solemnly swear or affirm
23	that the comments you're about to give are the truth?
24	MR. JUSTICE: I do.
25	JUDGE FEWELL: Can you please state and spell

1	Page 19 your name?
2	MR. JUSTICE: D-a-n-e, Dane, last name
3	Justice, J-u-s-t-i-c-e.
4	JUDGE FEWELL: You may proceed.
5	MR. JUSTICE: Yes, sir. So my comments are
6	not of a landowner for this specific area, this region.
7	I'm speaking on behalf of my family that cares very
8	deeply. Our family owns a lot of these plots and it's
9	affecting some of them heavily. I've witnessed it first
10	hand. We are talking about it every day, every night
11	hours on end because it's affecting us in ways that you
12	would not imagine.
13	Particularly I couldn't imagine that people
14	from a government-appointed for-profit company would
15	ever care to actually consider. This meeting, these
16	meetings have all been happening to kind of quell the
17	emotions of people in this area. They're doing their
18	best to make you believe that this is a land sale. This
19	is not a land sale. This is a civil asset 4 feature,
20	and you're supposed to believe that a one-time
21	compensation is fair. It's not fair. It's your entire
22	livelihoods that have been made off of this land. We're
23	not just talking about profitability. We're talking
24	about your ability to sell your crops to rent your land
25	to other farmers, CRP. We're talking about your ability



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1	Page 20 to rent that property to hunters. There's a lot of ways
2	that we use this. This isn't just podunk farmland that,
3	you know, city officials would otherwise like you to
4	believe, maybe not city officials but maybe companies
5	that are acting in special interest of government
б	entities.

7 What I would like to state very clearly is 8 that I don't believe a one-time payment for the asset 4 9 feature that's about to take place if it's so far down 10 the road already, which by the way is also on purpose. 11 Every single person that's spoken today has voiced that 12 they believe most of this has been swept through very 13 quickly under the table in ways that make it very hard 14 to adequately piece together every moving bit of this. 15 Do you know what I mean? It's hard to -- It's hard to 16 formulate true opinions about it when it moves so 17 quickly.

18 It feels like a specialized task force almost 19 in the way that this is being pushed and we're supposed 20 to lie down and take it. I don't believe that a single 21 solitary person here that has a vested interest in these 2.2 parcels should do so. I believe that every single 23 person here should be considering a required 24 compensation that's much longer than a one-time 25 It needs to be a compensation. If this has purchase.

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1	Page 21 to happen for any given reason, if this has to happen,
2	this needs to be a compensation that lasts long term.
3	We're talking the average profitability per each of
4	these parcels, if you need to have some kind of
5	numerical value to this. You can't just force people
6	off of their annual incomes. 50, 60 years, 100 years of
7	corn, of rent of all of this. This needs to be
8	accounted for. It can't just be Ameren doing their best
9	to get you to get off your land for their smallest
10	dollar. That needs amended if this has to go forward.
11	That's the only way that any of this is just is annual
12	payments for lost income.
13	JUDGE FEWELL: Thank you for your comments,
14	sir. I want to reiterate that this is kind of a fact
15	finding medium too in this. We are listening to the
16	comments of each of you that all of it will be
17	considered in the Commission's ultimate decision.
18	Is there anyone else who would like to make a
19	comment today? I don't see any hands. Would any
20	Keith Beggs raised his hand.
21	MR. BEGGS: Yeah. Can you hear me?
22	JUDGE FEWELL: Yes, I can. Will you raise
23	your right hand.
24	MR. BEGGS: Yes.
25	JUDGE FEWELL: Do you solemnly swear or affirm



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1	Page22 that the comments you're about to give are the truth?
2	MR. BEGGS: Yes.
3	JUDGE FEWELL: Can you please state and spell
4	your name?
5	MR. BEGGS: Keith Beggs, K-e-i-t-h B-e-g-g-s.
6	JUDGE FEWELL: What would you like to tell the
7	Commission?
8	MR. BEGGS: Well, I'd like to kind of dovetail
9	off that annual payment deal. I got a transmission line
10	easement already on my property and it sounds like
11	they're wanting to get another one. It was in 1951. I
12	was paid a total of \$48 for a lifetime of headache of
13	farming around. And the idea of another one-time
14	payment just is going to leave my kids farming for me
15	getting a little bit of money now and then having a
16	lifetime of headache of them coming in and restringing
17	line, smashing everything down, causing erosion. And so
18	I just wanted to put that on the record I guess.
19	JUDGE FEWELL: Appreciate your comments.
20	Would anyone else like to make a comment today? As a
21	reminder, if you're on your phone, star 6 to unmute
22	yourself. Okay. Would any of the Commissioners like to
23	make a closing remark?
24	COMMISSIONER HOLSMAN: Thank you, Judge. This
25	is Commissioner Holsman. I will.

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1	Page 23 JUDGE FEWELL: Thank you, Commissioner.
2	COMMISSIONER HOLSMAN: All right. On behalf
3	of Chairwoman Kayla Hahn and the entire Commission, we
4	just want to take a minute to thank everybody for coming
5	out and sharing their opinions. No decisions have been
6	made in this case. This is a fact finding part of the
7	process where we do get to hear from the community and
8	the public. You could do a lot of things today through
9	your lunch hour, but you chose to spend it with us and
10	share your thoughts. We do appreciate it. They do
11	matter. We do take them into consideration as we move
12	forward with this process. I wish everybody to have a
13	good day, and thank you again for coming.
