REGULATORY LAW JUDGE HATCHER: Let's go on Today is July 25th, 2025, and the the record. current time is 1:15 p.m. The Commission has set this time for a local public hearing in this case, and the Commission sets the local public hearing into two parts. The question and answer portion, and the testimony or the comment portion. A question and answer portion, which you just participated in, has concluded, and we are now going to start the testimony or the comment portion. I mentioned this, because the commissioners will not be able to answer any questions. They need to be impartial until all the evidence is presented at the evidentiary hearing. We will now start the comment portion of the hearing.

The Missouri Public Service Commission has set this time for a local public hearing to give members of the public a chance to comment about the Liberty's request for a rate increase. This is case number ER-2024-0261. The Commission is made up of five commissioners, and we currently have one



1	vacancy. The Commission's chair is Kayla Hahn,
2	and there is also commissioners Maida Coleman,
3	Commissioner Glenn Kolkmeyer, and Commissioner
4	John Mitchell. They're appointed by the
5	governor and confirmed by the Senate. The
6	commissioner employs a staff of engineers,
7	accountants, attorneys, financial analysts and
8	other specialists in the field of utility
9	regulation.
10	The Commission regulates the rate charged
11	by public utility companies to ensure that
12	those rates are just and reasonable. The
13	Commission also regulates the quality of
14	service and safety of operations. My name is
15	Charles Hatcher. I'm the regulatory law judge
16	that will oversee this hearing. With me on the
17	WebEx today are Commission Chair Kayla Hahn,
18	Commissioner Maida Coleman and Commissioner
19	John Mitchell. I believe that Commissioner
20	Glenn Kolkmeyer will be joining us a little bit
21	later. Are there any commissioners that would
22	like to make any opening remarks?
23	CHAIR HAHN: Of course, thanks, Judge
24	Hatcher. Just want to take a minute and thank
25	for everyone getting online this afternoon to

1	participate in this local public hearing. We
2	know that you can do a lot of things with your
3	Friday afternoon, but we really look forward to
4	hearing your comments in this case and
5	appreciate your time, and, so, on behalf of all
6	the commissioners, welcome, and we look forward
7	to hearing from you. Thank you.
8	REGULATORY LAW JUDGE HATCHER: Thank you,
9	chair Hahn. Let's go ahead and turn to the
10	parties to enter their appearance for the
11	record. First for the company, Liberty.
12	Please go ahead.

14	District Electric Company doing business as
15	Liberty.

22	REGULATORY LAW JUDGE HATCHER: Thank you,
23	sir, and the Office of the Public Counsel.
24	MR. WILLIAMS: Nathan Williams, Chief
25	Deputy Public Counsel, appearing on behalf of



the public and the Office of the Public Counsel.

REGULATORY LAW JUDGE HATCHER: Thank you, and this case has had several parties intervene. If those parties are here, and would like to introduce themselves for the record, please do so now. Okay, hearing none, this is a fairly well-attended hearing, and the Commission does want to hear from all of you. Therefore, we're going to need to limit comments to three minutes each.

This makes sure that you have time to give your comments, as well as time for your neighbors who are attending to also make their comments. You can feel free to let us that you just echo some earlier remarks, and later on, if you need to feel the need to give further comments, I'll give instructions on how to give those in writing on this case. I do ask that everyone please be polite and courteous and respect other people's opinions just as you would hopefully expect the same courtesy from them.

When I call your name, please unmute yourself and let me know that you're here.



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1	That will bring you to the front of our WebEx
2	screen. I will then place you under oath and
3	ask you to spell your last name for our court
4	reporter. With that in mind, I'll go ahead and
5	start calling names on our list. If you have
6	not signed up, once I finished with the persons
7	who have, then I'll open this up to the
8	audience and start allowing people who have not
9	preregistered to go ahead and give their
10	comments to the commission as well. The first
11	name I have on my list is Steve. Steve, if

25	questions and answers, and regarding the



comments made by, I forget her name, I am sorry, but she was with Liberty. She was talking about the profits in 2023, which they are basing -- basing their rate hikes on, said it was 150 million. They protected that the want is 186 million. She also said that during this time, they expected a 7.25 percent increase.

According to my calculations doing simple math, that's more of almost 35 percent. And I just don't -- I listened to the explanations, and it did not just sit with me. And they also failed to, you know -- they talked about the fact that the price for kilowatt per hour wasn't going to go up that much, but at the same time, they were talking about the service charges going up \$3, which is basically another 25 percent of what it is right now. And I just don't see that that justifies, according to my flier that I received, a 39 percent increase. I just don't understand. And that's all I have to say. Thank you.

REGULATORY LAW JUDGE HATCHER: Thank you,
Mr. Cooper. I appreciate you taking time to be
here today. The next name I have is Andy

21	Algonquin, a parent company. That it is a
22	company that is based on stock. Individuals
23	own stock, and so they owe their stockholders
24	an appropriate amount of return on their
25	investment. I will tell you that one in five



in my county, Jasper County are on fixed income. Economic security corporations who offers assistance with utilities are out of funds until October.

There are some others that do -- some, like every other year, but these are -- there will be more and more people that are unable to keep with all of the other costs that are rising. The increase that is requested is in excess of what we would -- we're being told that cost of living is increasing.

I understand that the company is saying it's not based on cost of living, but what are they planning to do to benefit the end user? make -- I get 1,350 a month, pay 675 a month for rent. That doesn't leave very much to pay for utilities, and certainly not for what is approaching a 30 percent increase. And that doesn't cover those types of -- there are several different line items on the bill that can fluctuate depending upon the cost of the market they have to pay to buy coal and other items to produce their energy, their electricity.

In the age of AI, nano technology, wind



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1	energy and solar energy, why are people who are
2	at the brink of financial disaster being asked
3	to shoulder the responsibility of shareholders'
4	profits, and the ongoing prolific growth that
5	Liberty is seeing. In the Joplin area alone,
6	we've seen an incredible increase in the number
7	of large businesses in the south southern
8	part of town. I have no idea my internal
9	clock doesn't work very well, so I don't know
LO	how much of my time I've utilized, but what
L1	I'm my point is, you can't get blood out of
L2	a turnip or a rock, and I will be 69 in
L3	December. I can't go out and work due to
L4	neurological events and deficits. I don't
L5	understand how the company has the gall to
L6	expect that we're going to absorb a 29.54
L7	increase, and the people that use the least
L8	kilowatt hours are paying the highest rate.
