JUDGE CLARK: Let's go on the record.

Good evening. It is April 16th of 2026, and the current time is 7:04 p.m. Now, the question and answer portion of the local public hearing just ended. If you had questions about this certificate of convenience and necessity case, I hope you were able to get answers to those questions.

Now is the formal part of the local public hearing, where the public can offer comments to the Commission. I'm going to ask that unless you're offering comments that you keep yourself muted, and if you are participating by phone, you can mute yourself by pressing star 6. Now, the Missouri Public Commission has set aside this time today for a virtual local public hearing in case number, EA-2025-0299, which is captioned as In the Matter of the Application of the Empire District Electric Company Doing Business as Liberty for a Certificate of Convenience and Necessity to Support Resource Advocacy.

My name is John Clark. I'm the regulatory

1 law judge presiding over this hearing tonight.
2 Now, the Missouri Public Service Commission
3 regulates the rates charged by investor-owned
4 utility companies in Missouri to ensure those
5 rates are just and reasonable. The Commission
6 also regulates the quality of service and the
7 safety of operations of investor-owned
8 utilities.

9 Now, the Commission is made up of five
10 commissioners: the Chair of the Commission,
11 Kayla Hahn and Commissioners Maida Coleman,
12 Glenn Kolkmeyer and John Mitchell. One
13 commission seat is currently vacant. Now, the
14 commissioners are appointed by the governor to
15 a fixed term and confirmed by the senate, and
16 they employ a staff of engineers, accountants,
17 attorneys, financial analysts and other
18 specialists in the field of utility regulation.

19 Now, with me today are Commissioners Maida
20 Coleman, Glenn Kolkmeyer and John Mitchell.
21 Commissioner Kolkmeyer, would you like to make
22 any opening remarks?

23 COMMISSIONER KOLKSMEYER: Yes, thank you,
24 Judge. On behalf of Chair Hahn and the other
25 commissioners, I want to welcome everyone here

1 to the local public hearing. We have not made
2 any decisions in this case. The reason why is
3 because we -- this is the first step, the
4 local public hearing, to hear from you, the
5 constituents and the ratepayers. We hear from
6 you first, so we have not taken any evidence;
7 we have not taken any testimony. We want to
8 hear from you first. So, here again, we want
9 to here what you have to say about this --
10 about this case. So, again, welcome.

11 It's a beautiful evening. You all could
12 be doing a whole lot of things besides setting
13 this local public hearing, but we sure welcome
14 you. So, thank you, Judge.

15 JUDGE CLARK: Thank you, Commissioner
16 Kolkmeier. Now, for the comment portion of
17 this hearing, a court reporter is transcribing
18 the hearing, and that's so the other
19 commissioners can review this later, and any
20 commissioners who were unable to be present
21 tonight, can read it and read your comments.

22 I will start by asking counsel to enter
23 their appearances for the record, and I will
24 start with the Empire District Electric Company
25 doing business as Liberty. Ms. Carter, I

1 believe you're muted. I still cannot hear you.

2 MS. CARTER: How about -- how about now?

3 JUDGE CLARK: I can hear you. Thank you
4 very much.

5 MS. CARTER: Diana Carter for the Empire
6 District Electric Company doing business as
7 Liberty.

8 JUDGE CLARK: Thank you. On behalf of
9 staff of the Commission?

10 MR. GRAHAM: Hello, this is Paul Graham.
11 And I represent the staff of the Missouri --
12 the legal counsel staff of the Missouri Public
13 Commission.

14 JUDGE CLARK: Thank you, Mr. Graham. On
15 behalf of the Office of Public Counsel?

16 MS. VANGERPEN: Good evening, Lindsey
17 VanGerpen on behalf of the OPC.

18 JUDGE CLARK: Is there any counsel present
19 I haven't called?

20 MS. MERS: Nicole Mers for Renew Missouri
21 is present, thank you.

22 JUDGE CLARK: Thank you, Ms. Mers, I
23 should have seen you there. Now, for those who
24 would like to provide comments today, let me
25 see really quick. For those who would like to

1 provide comments today, I'm going to call the
2 names in the order on a list I received. And
3 when I call your name, I'm going to ask that
4 you unmute yourself, I swear you in and you'll
5 have -- I will ask you to state and spell your
6 name for the record, and then you'll have a
7 chance to offer your comments to the
8 Commission. After you offer comment to the
9 Commission, don't immediately mute yourself
10 again, because you may -- we -- the
11 Commissioners may have questions for you or I
12 may have questions for you or the attorneys may
13 have questions for you.

14 If the Commissioners have questions,
15 please -- please feel free to ask them at any
16 time. If any attorneys have questions, please
17 get my attention and I will recognize you and
18 you will be able to ask your questions.

19 Now, the Commission, as Mr. Kolkmeyer --
20 or Commissioner Kolkmeyer eluded to, won't be
21 able to answer any questions today; and that's
22 because they have to remain partial --
23 impartial until after the evidence is presented
24 at any evidentiary hearing. If you have
25 questions about this case that were not

1 answered during the question and answer
2 portion, I'm going to ask you to speak to a
3 representative of the company, the Commission
4 Staff or the Office of the Public Counsel. I'm
5 going to also ask that -- that you be polite
6 while other people are offering their comments
7 and not interrupt them. Basically, treat
8 others as you would like to be treated.

9 With that in mind, I'm going to call the
10 first person to testify and let me know if I
11 butcher your name. Cheryl Marcum. Ms. Marcum.
12 And, again, if you are participating by phone,
13 you can press star 6 to unmute.

14 MS. MARCUM: Okay, hi.

15 JUDGE CLARK: Hello, would you raise your
16 right hand to be sworn?

17 (Cheryl Marcum sworn.)

18 JUDGE CLARK: Would you state and spell
19 your name for the record?

20 MS. MARCUM: Cheryl, C-h-e-r-y-l, Y.,
21 Marcum, M-a-r-c-u-m.

22 JUDGE CLARK: What would you like to tell
23 the Commission this evening about this case?

24 MS. MARCUM: Thank you for taking public
25 comments. This is real important. Emergencies

1 demand urgency. Our earth is rapidly
2 overheating as we talk right now about building
3 yet another natural gas-fueled generation
4 combustion unit that omits greenhouse gases
5 responsible for that overheating. I understand
6 that combusting natural gas, primarily methane,
7 produces fewer greenhouse gases than combusting
8 coal or oil; but our climate energy requires us
9 to stop combusting fossil fuels altogether now.

10 In addition, fracking, piping, trucking
11 methane is lethal to our environment in many
12 ways. Do not build this gas-fired plant.
13 Methane is a major driver of climate change
14 right now, while carbon dioxide remains in the
15 atmosphere for centuries and remains the
16 dominant driver of recent climate change,
17 methane remains in the atmosphere for about 12
18 years, but it is far more powerful at tracking
19 heat with the global warming potential 80 times
20 greater than that of carbon dioxide during the
21 20 years that grade is released into the
22 atmosphere.

23 That means that over its first 20 years in
24 the atmosphere, methane traps 86 times more
25 heat than carbon dioxide. Methane's short

1 lifespan and strong warming potential means
2 that reducing methane emissions is one of the
3 faster and cheapest solutions to immediately
4 slow the rate of global warming. Instead of
5 building this proposed 250 megawatt
6 climate-destroying methane gas-firing unit
7 adjacent to the state line power station,
8 capitalize on the existing infrastructure: the
9 transmission lines. Build and support
10 appropriately-sized state of the art battery
11 storage, plus solar and/or wind infrastructure
12 nearby for emissions-free -- free fuel that is
13 free forever. Someone called it 0-cost fuel,
14 and it mitigates climate change. Thank you.

15 JUDGE CLARK: Thank you for your comments,
16 Ms. Marcum. Camille Lombardi-Olive? Camille
17 Lombardi-Olive? And, again, if you are
18 participating by phone, press star 6 to unmute.
19 Pam Sawyer? Pam Sawyer? Laura Ness? Is there
20 a Laura Ness present? Brett Johnson? I
21 believe I see Mr. Johnson. .

22 MR. JOHNSON: Yeah, I am here.

23 JUDGE CLARK: Mr. Johnson, I have an
24 opportunity to read your written comments as
25 well.

1 MR. JOHNSON: Oh, thank you.

2 JUDGE CLARK: Would you raise your right
3 hand to be sworn in?

4 (Brad Johnson sworn.)

5 JUDGE CLARK: Would you state and spell
6 your spell name for the court reporter?

7 MR. JOHNSON: It's Brett Johnson,
8 B-r-e-t-t, J-o-h-n-s-o-n.

9 JUDGE CLARK: And thank you, Mr. Johnson,
10 what you would like to tell the Commission this
11 evening?

12 MR. JOHNSON: I basically had a less
13 eloquent version of what Cheryl just stated in
14 that methane -- the leakage on methane pipes
15 and its potency as a greenhouse gas makes it a
16 risky choice to use that solar-plus storage is
17 what I would vote, but also that it would
18 comply with Missouri's statewide energy study,
19 which recommends a No Regrets policy regarding
20 generation mechanism, as well as implementing a
21 building efficiency program as the most cost
22 effective and best for the environment
23 solution.

24 JUDGE CLARK: Can you say that last part
25 again?

1 MR. JOHNSON: Oh, the Missouri --
2 Missouri -- let's see, statewide energy study
3 recommends pursuing renewable energy as part of
4 its No Regrets policy, in which it doesn't rely
5 on people believing the science of climate
6 change, it's also the most economically viable
7 solution.

8 JUDGE CLARK: Okay, thank you very much.
9 Thank you for your comments. Cheryl Johnson?
10 Is there a Cheryl Johnson present? Amanda
11 Calderon-Kidston?

12 MS. CALDERON-KIDSTON: Yes, sir.

13 JUDGE CLARK: Would you raise your right
14 hand to be sworn?

15 (Amanda Caleron-Kidston sworn.)

16 JUDGE CLARK: And would you state and
17 spell your name for the record?

18 MS. CALDERON-KIDSTON : Certainly. My
19 name is Amanda Calderon-Kidston, spelled
20 A-m-a-n-d-a, C-a-l-d-e-r-o-n, dash,
21 K-i-d-s-t-o-n. Thank you for allowing me the
22 opportunity to address you tonight, Judge and
23 Commission. First of all, I want to express
24 deep concern and objection to the issuance of
25 the certificate of convenience and necessity.

1 My concerns are based in the lack of notice to
2 our neighbors across the state line in Kansas
3 and to the southwest of the location of this
4 state line powerplant in Oklahoma, including
5 the sovereign tribal entities that are located
6 within a 50 mile radius of this proposed plan.

7 The Peoria tribe and Quapaw tribe both
8 have designated Treatment of State status under
9 the Clean Air Act, and they have not had a
10 chance to weigh in or to present objection to
11 this project. Another concern is that our
12 community here in Joplin has recently been made
13 aware that a data center will be built and
14 implemented within the next few years in the
15 track of land known as the Wildwood Ranch. I
16 believe that increasing the capacity to produce
17 electricity will be directly linked to the data
18 center, whether or not that is confirmed here
19 at this hearing or not; but regardless, having
20 the increase in capacity of a natural gas
21 fuelled-electric facility, as well as a data
22 center is going to be not just a one punch, but
23 a one-two punch to the health and well-being of
24 this community and I strongly object to it.

25 I do not believe we can consciously

1 support that project be deemed convenient or
2 necessary. Thank you so much for your time
3 this evening.

4 JUDGE CLARK: Thank you for your comments.
5 Trudy Edare? Is there Trudy Edare present?
6 Margaret Shepard? And I apologize if I'm
7 butchering your name. Margaret Shepard?
8 Robert Meyer? Is there a Robert Meyer present?
9 Again, if you participating by phone, press
10 star 6 to unmute. Ted Butts? Is there a Ted
11 Butts present? Steven Dorsey? Is there a
12 Steven Dorsey present? And a Tim Emedley? Is
13 there Tim Emedley present?

14 Okay, those are the names that I had
15 signed up in advance to give testimony or to
16 offer comments at this hearing. I will try and
17 circle back at the end to see if any of those
18 people are here. At this time, I'm going to
19 open it to anybody who did not sign up that
20 realize now that they would like to offer
21 comments to the Commission about this case. Is
22 there anybody would like to offer comments to
23 the Commission. You may do so just unmute
24 yourself and I will -- I will call on the first
25 person that I am able to see. Okay, I'm going

1 to open one more time. Is there anybody else
2 who would like to offer comments to the
3 Commission at this time about this case? Okay,
4 I hear none. I'm going to go through the names
5 of people that I did not hear from one more
6 time, and I believe that would be Camille
7 Lombardi-Olive? Pam Sawyer? Laura Ness? Is
8 there a Laura Ness present? Cheryl Johnson?
9 Trudy Edare? Margaret Shepherd? I see your
10 hand raised from a Laura. Laura are you
11 wanting to -- if you can unmute yourself, are
12 you wanting to offer comments to the
13 Commission?

14 MR. SNIDER: Yes, this is actually Laura's
15 husband, Derek Snider.

16 JUDGE CLARK: Derek Snider. Did you want
17 to offers comments tonight?

18 MR. SNIDER: I would.

19 JUDGE CLARK: Okay, would you raise your
20 right hand to be sworn?

21 (Derek Snider sworn.)

22 JUDGE CLARK: Would you state and spell
23 your name for the court reporter, and then you
24 may offer your comments?

25 MR. SNIDER: Derek Snider, D-e-r-e-k,

1 S-n-i-d-e-r.

2 JUDGE CLARK: And go ahead, Mr. Snider.

3 MR. SNIDER: Yes, my comments are that
4 I've learned that this proposed expansion is
5 going to be southeast of the current retention
6 pond at the State Line power plant, which would
7 actually place it, based off what I've seen on
8 the map, as close to the residential
9 subdivision that exists out here as it possibly
10 could on the existing boundary property for
11 Liberty. Why would they plan to expand their
12 existing power plant and place it as close to
13 the residential subdivision as they could?
14 That seems to me to be the opposite of what
15 they should try to do if they want to provide
16 power but reduce any nuisance to surrounding
17 areas and surrounding communities.

18 JUDGE CLARK: Did you have any other
19 comments you wanted to offer?

20 MR. SNIDER: No, I think that's it. I
21 think's that's probably most of our concern out
22 here is, again, noise from an additional
23 turbine, shouldn't be any closer to residential
24 neighborhoods then where the current state
25 power plant is. Certainly not any closer than

1 the past one.

2 JUDGE CLARK: We received written comments
3 about the proximity to residential areas. I
4 saw -- thank you for your comments, Mr. Snyder.
5 I saw one other -- Randall? Randall, did you
6 wish to make comments to the Commission this
7 evening? I saw him go up momentarily. I will
8 continue down the list now of people I called
9 through once. Robert Myer? Is there a Robert
10 Myer present? Ted Butts? Is there a Ted Butts
11 present? Steven Dorsey? Is there a Steven
12 Dorsey present? Kent Houston? I may have
13 missed that one the first time. Is there a
14 Kent Houston present? I'm sorry. Is there a
15 Kent Houston?

16 MR. BARKER: That might have been me. I'm
17 off mute, or I didn't know how to do this.
18 Randall.

19 JUDGE CLARK: Okay, what's your last name,
20 Randall?

21 MR. BARKER: Barker.

22 JUDGE CLARK: Okay, and would you raise
23 your right hand to be sworn?

24 (Randall Barker sworn.)

25 JUDGE CLARK: Would you state and spell

1 your name for the court reporter?

2 MR. BARKER: R-a-n-d-a-l-l, B-a-r-k-e-r,
3 and I submitted some comments tonight over the
4 phone and just now while I was trying to get
5 this figured out, because I never got signed
6 up. Anyway, so, this is about the 250
7 gigawatt, right, because there's many issues
8 that I've addressed.

9 JUDGE CLARK: That's correct. This is
10 about the natural gas turbine generator.

11 MR. BARKER: Yes. I'm totally opposed to
12 it, and I know that neighborhood, and my aunt
13 is there. Lives right by the power plant that
14 is existing now, and my uncle was there until
15 he passed. It is loud already with the one
16 that's there. I've been there when he was
17 passing and visiting at their house before.
18 And I can't imagine what the other one is like
19 alone as a little bit of where the people are
20 talking about the data center, which I've been
21 following up and is my next, you know, mission.
22 So, I feel that with Liberty's -- they can't
23 get their house in order now; I don't know why
24 they would ever be allowed to add 250 gigawatts
25 of anything anywhere and many other things

1 they're trying right now.

2 They just -- they're doing harm to this --
3 my area that I represent as an advocate and all
4 across Missouri as we all know through the PSC
5 and OPC. I followed every meeting they have
6 and went to all of those town halls, all of it.
7 So, they're very detrimental to the elderly and
8 the less fortunate and financially -- people,
9 including businesses and homes. It's not --
10 it's not any more -- like what school district
11 is the property I might want to buy or the
12 business I want to start. It is what electric
13 company is it? They want away from Liberty,
14 and they will not buy or purchase that home or
15 rent because it's Liberty, and they're out of
16 the price range so far now besides this.

17 I don't know the answer if they're wanting
18 to -- this is going to be charged to us also in
19 addition to the Asbury thing, which is a
20 problem, is a problem and still an ongoing
21 problem. And all this is in my comments and
22 more. I just don't know how can you allow -- I
23 mean, they are literally stealing from people,
24 solar, straight electric out of their AMI
25 meters, and the Asbury plant was a fraud, let

1 alone adding in this 250 gigawatts and many
2 other things that they have in the works that
3 I've been following.

4 I've been lied to by Mr. Wilson,
5 Christopher Huskilson, the CEO is from Canada
6 and is Missouri going to just sell ourselves
7 out to the Canada and China and Germany? I
8 mean, we need off this train, and this monopoly
9 needs to be broke from Liberty. They're doing
10 major harm to our society, our citizens, our
11 businesses and everything around us, including
12 also the potential of all the -- all the toxic
13 runoff, especially if there was to be a data
14 center there, too. In addition, they're to
15 have -- besides adding more than the 250
16 gigawatt. I think that's kind of it. I don't
17 know. I have a lot more to say, I'm sure, I
18 could go on and on for forever.

19 JUDGE CLARK: Well, Mr. Barker, the
20 Commission appreciates your comments. Thank
21 you.

22 MR. BARKER: Thank you.

23 JUDGE CLARK: Is there a Tim Emedley
24 present? Is there anybody else who would like
25 to offer comments at this time?

1 MR. STORRIE: Judge?

2 JUDGE CLARK: Yes?

3 MR. STORRIE: My name is Cheryl -- excuse
4 me.

5 JUDGE CLARK: Sorry, go ahead.

6 MR. STORRIE: My name is Harold Storrie,
7 got it. H-a-r-o-l-d, S-t-o-r-r-i-e. I live in
8 Joplin and I thought we --

9 JUDGE CLARK: Ms. Storrie (sic), can you
10 hold on just a second. Would you raise your
11 right hand to be sworn?

12 (Harold Storrie sworn.)

13 JUDGE CLARK: Please go ahead.

14 MR. STORRIE: I thought that the data
15 center could be approved had to provide its own
16 energy source. Am I wrong about that?

17 JUDGE CLARK: As I indicated earlier, and
18 I apologize, but the Commission can't answer
19 questions at this time. That's what the
20 question and answer portion of the hearing is
21 from -- is for. We can't answer those
22 questions because the commissioners and myself
23 have to remain impartial until after any
24 evidentiary hearing, so I apologize. I can't
25 answer your question, Ms. Storrie. Did you

1 have any other comments that you wanted to
2 offer the Commission?

3 MR. STORRIE: No, thank you.

4 JUDGE CLARK: Thank you for your comments,
5 and I saw one other individual. Is there
6 anyone else who would like to offer comments to
7 the Commission at this time?

8 MS. LOCKHART: Yes.

9 JUDGE CLARK: Okay. Would you -- would
10 you please state and spell your names.

11 MS. LOCKHART: Lisa Lockhart, L-i-s-a,
12 L-o-c-k-h-a-r-t.

13 JUDGE CLARK: And would you raise your
14 right hand to be sworn?

15 (Lisa Lockhart sworn.)

16 JUDGE CLARK: Please go ahead.

17 MS. LOCKHART: Okay, I just wanted to
18 state my opinion that I'm against this
19 addition, and I think the methane gas is a real
20 problem that we should not allow ourselves to
21 do this to the earth, and that's -- I'm
22 opposed.

23 JUDGE CLARK: Okay, thank you,
24 Ms. Lockhart. The Commission appreciates your
25 comments this evening.

1 MS. LOCKHART: Okay.

2 JUDGE CLARK: Is there anyone else that
3 would like to comment at this time?

4 MS. MITCHELL: Susan Mitchell.

5 JUDGE CLARK: I'm sorry?

6 MS. MITCHELL: Susan Mitchell.

7 JUDGE CLARK: Susan Mitchell. Would you
8 spell your name?

9 MS. MITCHELL: Yes. S-u-s-a-n,
10 M-i-t-c-h-e-l-l.

11 JUDGE CLARK: And would you raise your
12 right hand to be sworn.

13 (Susan Mitchell sworn.)

14 JUDGE CLARK: Please go ahead.

15 MS. MITCHELL: Okay, I'm in the area, but
16 I don't believe, really believe, that that
17 should be in all of this residential, amongst
18 all the residential that we have in the area.
19 I don't know any large plants that have, you
20 know, that size in residential. So, that's
21 what concerns me: the air pollution, the noise
22 pollution with all the residents around. I'm
23 just kind of -- I kind of think that a lot, you
24 know, with them needing that increase, is for
25 the Bitcoin mining that's in area, and they're

1 advertising for more to come in. I think
2 that's why they want it, but I don't know that
3 for sure. And, you know, I don't -- we haven't
4 had any power outages. I'm only, you know,
5 maybe a mile from the plant. There's not been
6 power outages. I haven't seen that we need
7 anything -- need any more, and we produce solar
8 here at our house. So -- and there's a lot of
9 customers with solar. So, I don't know why
10 they continue, you know, to need more and more
11 infrastructure, you know, unless it's mainly
12 for the data centers trying to come in the
13 area. Or maybe Liberty needs to look at their
14 budget like, you know, the people, the citizens
15 have to have a budget. We all have a budget.

16 It's hard to stick with that budget when
17 you continue to get rate hikes from your
18 utility companies. So, I strictly oppose it.
19 I don't like the rate hike that they're doing
20 to people, and we don't need that in this area.
21 There's people right across the street.
22 There's people, you know, within a block of
23 that plant that -- well, maybe not a block
24 about three blocks. But I just don't think the
25 noise needs to be there or the pollution. And

1 they need to figure out how to work off of the
2 money they received from the people, not
3 continuously get more and more and more because
4 we don't get to do that as citizens. As we
5 need it, we don't go out and ask, you know, for
6 more and more and more and charge it. They
7 just continue to get more than what they
8 deserve and what they're putting out. So, no,
9 I don't want it, and I don't think the
10 neighbors do. That's all I have to say, thank
11 you.

12 JUDGE CLARK: Thank you, Ms. Mitchell. Is
13 there anybody else who would like to comment at
14 this time? I hear none. I'd like to -- would
15 any commissioners like to make any closing --
16 well, I'm sorry. Commissioner Coleman, would
17 you like to make closing remarks?

18 COMMISSIONER COLEMAN: Yes, thank you
19 Judge. I'd like to thank each and every person
20 that has shown up online to participate in the
21 testimony that it's so crucial for we
22 commissioners to hear in order to make
23 decisions regarding the cases that come before
24 us. I thank you, and I appreciate the fact you
25 are here on a very nice evening, as

1 Commissioner Kolkmeier mentioned. It's
2 important to us to get input, and it's
3 important to know that these issues are real to
4 the people that are affected by it. So, again,
5 thank you very much for your input. If you
6 did -- if you had a question, such as
7 Mr. Storrie and wasn't able to, of course, get
8 it answered in this portion of tonight's event,
9 please reach out to the Public Service
10 Commission or to the company if you have
11 questions and want to get those clarified.
12 Thank you and thank you, Judge.

13 JUDGE CLARK: Thank you, Commissioner
14 Coleman. I would also like to thank our all
