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- 1 PROCEEDINGS
- JUDGE DALE: Welcome. We are here
- 3 tonight, September 10, 2008, in the matter of Union Electric
- 4 Company, d/b/a AmerenUE's request for increased annual
- 5 revenues, Case No. ER-2008-0318. This is a local public
- 6 hearing at which members of the public may come and give us
- 7 any remarks that they wish to, and then Commissioner Jarrett
- 8 may have some questions.
- 9 Gregg, will you call the first witness,
- 10 please.
- 11 MR. OCHOA: Judge Dale, do you want to
- 12 do some appearances from counsel?
- JUDGE DALE: Oh, okay, sure. Who's
- 14 there?
- MR. BYRNE: Your Honor, I'm Tom Byrne,
- 16 representing AmerenUE. My address is 1901 Chouteau Avenue,
- 17 St. Louis, Missouri 63103.
- JUDGE DALE: Thank you, Mr. Byrne.
- MR. BYRNE: Thank you.
- 20 MR. MILLS: Lewis Mills on behalf of
- 21 the Office of the Public Counsel, and my address is Post
- 22 Office Box 2230, Jefferson City, Missouri 65102.
- JUDGE DALE: Thank you. Staff?
- MR. FREY: Dennis L. Frey, representing
- 25 the staff in the Missouri Public Service Commission, Post

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1 Office Box 360, Jefferson City, Missouri 65102.
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- JUDGE DALE: Is there anyone else who
- 3 wishes to enter an appearance?
- 4 MR. MILLS: No.
- 5 MR. BYRNE: No.
- 6 JUDGE DALE: Is there any other matter
- 7 that I need to discuss before we call the first witness?
- 8 MR. MILLS: No.
- 9 MR. BYRNE: No.
- 10 JUDGE DALE: Okay. Introduce the first
- 11 witness.
- MR. OCHOA: We've got Margieann
- 13 Leaming.
- 14 MS. LEAMING: M-A-R-G-I-E-A-N-N
- 15 L-E-A-M-I-N-G.
- MR. OCHOA: Sorry about that, Judge.
- 17 JUDGE DALE: That's okay. All right.
- Go ahead, Mrs. Leaming.
- 19 MS. LEAMING: I --
- JUDGE DALE: Oh, would you please raise
- 21 your right hand.
- 22 (Thereupon, Witness Leaming was sworn on
- 23 her oath by Judge Dale.)
- Thank you. Go ahead and give us your remarks.
- MS. LEAMING: Well, I'm 66 years old.

- 1 I own -- I'm buying my own house, and I'm having trouble
- 2 paying bills because I'm on a fixed income. I have gone out
- 3 and got a part-time job. I can't afford any more increases,
- 4 and I know they're coming.
- 5 It -- it bothers me that there's no help for
- 6 senior citizens. When they're on fixed incomes, and they
- 7 can't pay their bills, they feel like they don't have a
- 8 recourse. They don't have any way to help themselves.
- 9 And I have called Ameren several times to
- 10 discuss my bill with them, and finally got so frustrated
- 11 that I just said shut it off. And I know they can't, but it
- 12 just -- I have no power over how much they want to charge --
- 13 how much you want to charge me and how much I can pay
- 14 because of the fixed income. And I don't think that that's
- 15 right.
- I think that there are a lot of people that
- 17 can afford more, but people on fixed incomes can't. They
- 18 don't get the increases like you do, Ameren does, and I
- 19 think that needs to be taken into account when the increases
- 20 -- when you ask for an increase.
- 21 And I thank you for listening to me.
- 22 JUDGE DALE: Thank you. Commissioner
- 23 Jarrett, any questions?
- 24 COMMISSIONER JARRETT: Yes. My name is
- 25 Terry Jarrett. I'm one of the five Commissioners of the

- 1 Public Service Commission. I want to thank you for your
- 2 testimony, and I have a couple of questions.
- 3 How long have you been a customer of Ameren's?
- 4 MS. LEAMING: I have been in Dexter,
- 5 Missouri for 11 years, at 2 different places.
- 6 COMMISSIONER JARRETT: And have you
- 7 ever had any problems -- any problems in service?
- MS. LEAMING: No, I haven't.
- 9 COMMISSIONER JARRETT: And you said you
- 10 talked with the company several times about your bill. What
- 11 was the nature of your conversations?
- 12 MS. LEAMING: The problem is -- is that
- 13 I have only \$200 a month I can pay for my bill, and my bill
- 14 is more than that. And I struggle to pay that, and that's
- 15 what that --
- 16 COMMISSIONER JARRETT: Well --
- 17 MS. LEAMING: That's what we discussed.
- 18 COMMISSIONER JARRETT: When you talked
- 19 with the service folks there at Ameren, were they courtesy
- 20 and professional, and did they try to help you?
- MS. LEAMING: Yes, they did. They --
- 22 they really tried. I have to give them that. I mean, it's
- 23 not their fault, and they're in a hard spot trying to
- 24 explain all this to me and follow their rules, and I know
- 25 that. And I try to keep my temper under control when I

- 1 call, which isn't always easy.
- COMMISSIONER JARRETT: Well, anyway, I
- 3 don't have any further questions. But thank you very much,
- 4 ma'am, for your testimony. It's very important, and we will
- 5 consider it.
- 6 MS. LEAMING: Thank you.
- 7 JUDGE DALE: Thank you, Mrs. Leaming.
- 8 MR. OCHOA: The next witness is Mr. Ken
- 9 Jackson.
- 10 MR. JACKSON: Hello.
- 11 JUDGE DALE: Good evening, Mr. Jackson.
- 12 Would you please raise your right hand.
- 13 (Thereupon, Witness Jackson was sworn on
- 14 his oath by Judge Dale.)
- Thank you. Please go ahead and give your
- 16 remarks.
- MR. JACKSON: Well, I -- I'm the
- 18 superintendent of schools here in Dexter. And first of all,
- 19 I want to say that we've been well served by Ameren, and
- 20 they are good neighbors to our school district. And when we
- 21 have an issue, they're quick to resolve it, and I have many
- 22 friends that work with Ameren. So I'm not -- just not here
- 23 to come and complain about the quality of service, because
- it's been good.
- 25 I quess my concern is when I heard about the

- 1 opportunity to present tonight, the 12.1 percent increase,
- 2 our -- our district currently pays 20 to 25 thousand dollars
- 3 a month to Ameren. And it's -- it's a difficult time in
- 4 this area, as well as the rest of the state, with increasing
- 5 costs in other areas. We also have a fairly substantial gas
- 6 bill for the district, so our total bill is 350 to 400
- 7 thousand dollars per year that we're spending on utilities.
- 8 And a 12 percent on 300,000 would be \$36,000.
- 9 That's one less teacher that I'll be able to employ for the
- 10 next school year, and you pass that along with increased
- 11 transportation and fuel costs, food costs, delivery costs go
- 12 up for us every day, health insurance cost increasing, it's
- just getting more -- obviously more and more difficult.
- 14 And I realize their costs go up too. They provide
- 15 a service as well. So I'm not sure what the answer is, but
- 16 at a time like this, to be looking at a double-digit
- 17 increase in the rates, it's really going to -- it's going to
- 18 be a tremendous burden. We're losing industry in this area.
- 19 On the news last night, we have some
- 20 well-established businesses that are going out. And I know
- 21 it's tough on people right now. We see our free and reduced
- 22 lunch rates going up. As a matter of fact, we have 90
- 23 students more in our district this year than the same time
- 24 last year that are qualifying for free and/or reduced
- 25 lunches.

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1 So I -- I just say that because it's a
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- 2 difficult time, and, you know, the margin -- the operating
- 3 margin is getting slimmer and slimmer it seems like, and I'm
- 4 -- while I'm not having a difficult time personally paying
- 5 my bills, there are many families in our community who are.
- 6 And I hate to see them see a double-digit increase in their
- 7 rates.
- 8 JUDGE DALE: Thank you. Could you tell
- 9 me 90 out of how many students?
- 10 MR. JACKSON: We have approximately
- 11 2,000 students in our district. Our free and reduced lunch
- 12 rate, most years, runs from 45 to 47 percent. That's about
- 13 what it was last year K through 12, and we have an addition-
- 14 -- I just learned this information yesterday. We have an
- 15 additional 90 students that have qualified for free or
- 16 reduced this year as compared to last.
- JUDGE DALE: Thank you.
- 18 MR. JACKSON: Thank you.
- 19 JUDGE DALE: Commissioner Jarrett?
- 20 COMMISSIONER JARRETT: Mr. Jackson.
- JUDGE DALE: Mr. Jackson?
- MR. JACKSON: Yes.
- 23 COMMISSIONER JARRETT: Commissioner
- 24 Jarrett. I just had a couple of questions. I thank you for
- 25 your testimony.

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1 You just gave us that there were a couple of
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- 2 companies that are leaving the area, I believe?
- 3 MR. JACKSON: Yes.
- 4 COMMISSIONER JARRETT: Do you know the
- 5 names of those companies?
- 6 MR. JACKSON: I do. One of them I
- 7 can't -- it's not public knowledge yet, so I can't say that.
- 8 The -- the other is Gale --
- 9 COMMISSIONER JARRETT: Okay.
- 10 MR. JACKSON: Galemore Motors in
- 11 Charleston, Missouri. It's -- it's a car dealership that's
- 12 been there 52 years. They've had four dealerships, and it
- 13 was announced in the news last night they're closing, and
- 14 it's typical of what we're seeing in our community down here
- 15 right now.
- And we're close to the Boot Hill, and the
- 17 median family income is not real substantial, and it was
- 18 testified earlier tonight about people on a fixed income.
- 19 We're a rural area, a lot of retirees, and it's a pretty
- 20 tough time for people in this area.
- 21 COMMISSIONER JARRETT: Did they give a
- 22 reason why they were leaving; was it financial, --
- MR. JACKSON: Yes.
- 24 COMMISSIONER JARRETT: -- lack of
- 25 sales?

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1 MR. JACKSON: Yeah, it's a sign of the
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- 2 economy I believe, poor sales and, you know, people are just
- 3 making do with what they have as opposed to buying new
- 4 vehicles right now.
- 5 COMMISSIONER JARRETT: Mr. Jackson, we
- 6 thank you for your testimony tonight. I appreciate it.
- 7 MR. JACKSON: You're welcome.
- MR. OCHOA: Judge Dale, we've got
- 9 another witness, Mr. Jeff Dudley.
- 10 MR. DUDLEY: Hello. How are you today?
- JUDGE DALE: I'm good. Mr. Dudley,
- 12 could you spell your last name for me, please.
- MR. DUDLEY: D-U-D-L-E-Y.
- 14 JUDGE DALE: Thank you. I just wanted
- 15 to make sure I heard it correctly. Would you please raise
- 16 your right hand.
- 17 (Thereupon, Witness Dudley was sworn on
- 18 his oath by Judge Dale.)
- 19 Thank you. Please give your remarks.
- 20 MR. DUDLEY: Well, I'm late. I just
- 21 got here. I'm not for sure what -- what's really going on.
- 22 They just -- I walked in the door, and they asked me to come
- 23 up here.
- 24 What my statement is I have some issues with
- 25 our rates being raised. Whenever I first bought my house,

1 they wouldn't turn my gas on because they said I didn't have

- 2 a double-walled pipe going through my vent -- through my
- 3 ceiling. And I assured them that I did, asked them to go up
- 4 to the attic they could look at it, where it's coming out
- 5 going through the roof.
- 6 They declined to do that, said they wasn't
- 7 going to walk on my rafters, and I had to strip out my
- 8 sheetrock to prove to them that I had my gas, that I had
- 9 double-walled pipes. And then after that, after I stripped
- 10 it down, they sent me a bill for that month for \$8 and 90
- 11 something cents, and they hadn't even turned my gas on for
- 12 gas.
- 13 And my other issue is all I have is a hot
- 14 water heater which is natural gas, and it's running me right
- 15 at 59 to 60 something dollars a month. My brother, all he
- 16 has is hot water down here on the east end of town, eastern
- 17 side of town, and his is only \$29. And I'd like to find out
- 18 what that -- you know, what that is, what the issue is
- 19 there.
- JUDGE DALE: Is there -- does Mr. Ochoa
- 21 have a consumer representative there, a Consumer Services
- 22 representative?
- MR. OCHOA: Yes.
- MR. DUDLEY: Yes, ma'am.
- 25 JUDGE DALE: After you finish

- 1 testifying, you can talk to that person, and they may be
- 2 able to answer some of your questions about the differences
- 3 in hot water heaters and how to find out what exactly the
- 4 difference is.
- 5 MR. DUDLEY: Okay.
- 6 JUDGE DALE: Do you have anything else
- 7 you want to say?
- 8 MR. DUDLEY: I oppose the rate
- 9 increase.
- JUDGE DALE: Okay. Thank you.
- MR. DUDLEY: Thank you.
- 12 JUDGE DALE: Commissioner Jarrett, do
- 13 you have questions?
- 14 COMMISSIONER JARRETT: Mr. Dudley,
- 15 Commissioner Jarrett. I don't have any questions, but I do
- 16 thank you for your testimony this evening.
- MR. DUDLEY: Okay. Thank you.
- 18 JUDGE DALE: Thank you, Mr. Dudley.
- 19 MR. OCHOA: Judge Dale, that's the last
- 20 person that has signed up or wants to testify.
- 21 JUDGE DALE: Is there anyone else who
- 22 wishes to testify who hasn't signed up?
- MR. OCHOA: No, your Honor. That's it.
- JUDGE DALE: Well, I thank you very
- 25 much. We appreciate all of you coming out and telling us

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your opinion about this. The Commission does take these
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    hearings very seriously, and there are other issues that
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     will have to be considered.
