2	JUDGE DALE: My name is Colleen M. Dale.
3	I'm the administrative law judge with the
4	Missouri Public Service Commission.
5	We're here this evening on August 22nd,
6	2006, for a hearing in the matter of a proposed
7	rule regarding electric, utility, fuel and
8	purchase power cost recovery mechanisms, Case
9	No. EX-2006-0472. Particularly we are
10	discussing Rules 4 CSR 240-3.161 and 4 CSR
11	240-20.090, at this time to establish an
12	electric, utility, fuel, and purchase power
13	mechanisms and to implement such mechanisms.
14	We have one person signed up to make either
15	comments or testimony this evening. If you want
16	to make comments you can just make comments. If
17	you want to testify you can be sworn and
18	testify. All of the comments that you make, if
19	you decide to send a letter to the Commission
20	after tonight's hearing or if you testify or
21	whatever, they're all given equal weight. So
22	it's entirely up to you how you want to do it.
23	With that I'll call forward Becky
24	Mansfield.
25	JUDGE DALE: Before you do that,

1	Ms. Mansfield, let's do quick entries of
2	appearance, starting with Mr. Mills.
3	MR. MILLS: My name is Louis Mills. My
4	address is Post Office Box 2230, Jefferson City,
5	Missouri 65102. I appear on behalf of the
6	Office of the Public Counsel and the public.
7	JUDGE DALE: Mr. Coffman.
8	MR. COFFMAN: My name is John B. Coffman,
9	871 Tuxedo Boulevard, St. Louis, Missouri 63119,
10	appearing on behalf of AARP.
11	JUDGE DALE: Okay. No others? Okay.
12	Thank you.
13	Sorry about that, Ms. Mansfield. So do you
14	want to testify or just make comments?
15	MS. MANSFIELD: I will testify.
16	JUDGE DALE: Then please raise your right
17	hand. Do you swear or affirm that the testimony
18	you're about to give to be the truth?
19	MS. MANSFIELD: I do.
20	JUDGE DALE: Thank you. Please proceed.
21	THE WITNESS: My name is Becky Mansfield.
22	Do you need my address?
23	JUDGE DALE: Yes, please.
24	THE WITNESS: 14002 Ballantrae Drive in
25	Grandview, Missouri 64030.

1	JUDGE DALE: Thank you.
2	THE WITNESS: I'm here on behalf of a
3	senior citizen. And after reading the
4	information that I have in front of me
5	concerning this FAC, I feel that this is going
6	to be a hardship on the senior citizens of
7	Missouri because most of us are on a fixed
8	income. And we need to know pretty closely on a
9	monthly basis what our bills are going to be,
10	our utility bills. Especially our utility
11	bills. I don't think we can tolerate much
12	fluctuation in any of these charges.
13	We have bills here now, like our
14	electricity bill, that has certain charges on it
15	that we don't even identify. It just says,
16	"customer charge."
17	That's another thing that senior's object
18	to, is we don't understand. Even though all the
19	information is spelled out in the back of the
20	utility bills, it's a little difficult to
21	exactly know what we're being charged for.
22	I think I do oppose this. It is just
23	too actually, it's a little difficult to
24	understand, except that yes, it's going to be
25	it could be a surcharge. It could fluctuate

1	during the year. And that it would be difficult
2	for us to arrange our budgets to go along with
3	this kind of fluctuation.
4	That's all I have to say. Thank you.
5	JUDGE DALE: I have a couple questions.
6	The one that I always ask is whether or not
7	you have any specific proposed language changes
8	to the rule.
9	THE WITNESS: No, I do not.
10	JUDGE DALE: The other one has to do with
11	when you're talking about budgeting. Do you
12	know if your electric utility provider allows
13	you to do some sort of budget billing where you
14	pay a set amount every month?
15	THE WITNESS: No, I do not know that.
16	JUDGE DALE: Okay. I don't know if they do
17	or not. I'm just asking.
18	THE WITNESS: My utility provider is
19	Aquila, so I don't know if they provide that or
20	not.
21	JUDGE DALE: I don't have any other
22	questions.
23	THE WITNESS: Thank you.
24	JUDGE DALE: Thank you.
25	Is there anyone else here who is not signed

1	up who would like to testify? Sir? Your name?
2	MR. SANDS: Marvin Sands. I'm representing
3	AARP.
4	JUDGE DALE: Please step up, Mr. Sands.
5	Would you like to testify or just make comments?
6	MR. SANDS: Testify and make comments.
7	JUDGE DALE: Well. Raise your right hand.
8	MR. SANDS: One and the same I think.
9	JUDGE DALE: Do you swear or affirm that
10	the testimony you are about to give to be the
11	truth?
12	MR. SANDS: Yes.
13	JUDGE DALE: Thank you. Please proceed.
14	THE WITNESS: Once again, my name is Marvin
15	Sands. I'm representing AARP.
16	Our position is that the fuel adjustment
17	cause that is being currently proposed by the
18	Public Service Commission should not go forward
19	as it so stated. I think probably what the
20	indication is here that all 100 percent of that
21	charge is being forecast to go forward. It's
22	not our position that that should occur.
23	There are several reasons why. Number one
24	is that the utility company, regardless of who
25	it is, passing along 100 percent of their

efforts or charge such as this, there is no 1 2 responsibility on behalf of the utility to 3 undergo any management expense. Doing this mere 4 allows them to pass along that complete 5 responsibility on to the customer. And for that 6 any regards to responsibility as far as 7 management of those issues are a concern. So 8 it's our position that they should undergo some management expertise in this regard and not 9 allow all 100 percent of the charge go forward 10 11 to the consumer. 12 JUDGE DALE: Thank you. Do you have any specific language changes that you would like 13 made to the rules? 14 THE WITNESS: Yes, we do. Right now we're 15 proposing that at least at the very minimum 50 16 percent of that be passed on to the consumer and 17 not 100 percent of it. 18 And in addition to that, AARP's position is 19 20 that quite frankly that would be the minimum 21 amount that should be passed on to the consumer. 22 Again, based upon the utility undergoing some 23 management expertise in controlling expenses. 24 JUDGE DALE: Thank you. Is there anyone else who wishes to testify 25

or make comments? Ma'am? 1 2 MS. WULSER: I just walked in to the 3 meeting. Do you say what percentage of increase 4 there will be? How often it will increase? I missed some of this I believe. 5 6 JUDGE DALE: At the information session there was a discussion about it. And at this 7 8 point there is no set percentage of the increase. It's not like a rate case in that 9 respect. There will be some ability of the 10 11 company to pass through it's increased fuel 12 costs, which is a certain portion of all their costs. 13 And what the Commission will do is set up a 14 15 rate recovery mechanism that allows them to pass through those increases and decreases in fuel 16 17 costs to customers on a monthly basis. They can change it up to four times a year. So it's 100 18 19 percent of the fuel costs changes. 20 MS. WULSER: Has this law put a cap on 21 anything? I mean, or is it just going to go up 22 a bunch without a limitation? I don't know how 23 the law reads. JUDGE DALE: The way it is now, it's not 24 capped because the Commission doesn't have any 25

1	way to ascertain what the maximum fuel price
2	will be.
3	MS. WULSER: But it's only on the fuel
4	increase is what you're saying to me?
5	JUDGE DALE: Yes. It's a way to pass
6	through the changes in their fuel costs. Right
7	now gas companies have a similar mechanism, but
8	electric companies do not. The change in the
9	law that happened a couple years ago, that
10	allowed this to happen, set up a similar thing
11	for electric companies.
12	What we're talking about tonight is the
13	rule that the Commission has set up that will
14	handle all the fine details of exactly how this
15	happens, what kind of process they have to go
16	through, that sort of thing.
17	MS. WULSER: I am, I guess, pessimistic in
18	that regard. Once things go up I don't think
19	they come down very often.
20	And then the grave concern to me as a
21	taxpayer, there's a lot of people struggling to
22	exist. I hope the Commission realizes that.
23	And it's hard for us out there also. And I hope
24	it is not going to mean more and better CEO
25	salaries and that type of thing. I hope it's

1	going to be used properly if there is an
2	increase.
3	JUDGE DALE: I can tell you that our
4	auditors are always on the lookout for that sort
5	of thing. They feel the same way you do about
6	that. And this will be subject to our auditors
7	scrutiny.
8	And can I get your name, please, for the
9	record?
10	MS. WULSER: My name is Jean Wulser,
11	W-u-l-s-e-r. I'm a resident of Grandview.
12	JUDGE DALE: Thank you.
13	Anyone else? Hearing nothing further then
14	we will be adjourned and off the record.
