- JUDGE DALE: We are here today in the
- 3 matter of The Empire District Electric Company of Joplin,
- 4 Missouri for authority to file tariffs increasing rates
- 5 for electric service provided to customers in the Missouri
- 6 service area of the company, Case No. ER-2006-0315.
- 7 At this point we will take entries of
- 8 appearance, beginning with Staff.
- 9 MR. FREY: Thank you, your Honor.
- 10 Representing the Staff of the Missouri Public Service
- 11 Commission, Dennis L. Frey and Steven Dottheim, P.O.
- 12 Box 360, Jefferson City, Missouri 65102.
- JUDGE DALE: Thank you.
- 14 MR. MILLS: On behalf of the Office of the
- 15 Public Counsel and the public, my name is Lewis Mills. My
- 16 address is Post Office Box 2230, Jefferson City, Missouri
- 17 65102.
- 18 MR. SWEARENGEN: James C. Swearengen and
- 19 Janet Wheeler appearing on behalf of The Empire District
- 20 Electric Company. We're with Brydon, Swearengen &
- 21 England, 312 East Capitol Avenue, Jefferson City,
- 22 Missouri. Thank you.
- MS. WOODS: Shelley Woods, Assistant
- 24 Attorney General, Post Office Box 899, Jefferson City,
- 25 Missouri 65102, appearing on behalf of the Missouri

- 1 Department of Natural Resources.
- 2 MR. CONRAD: On behalf of Praxair and
- 3 Explorer Pipeline, let the record please show the
- 4 appearance of Stuart W. Conrad and David L. Woodsmall of
- 5 the law firm Finnegan, Conrad & Peterson, 3100 Broadway,
- 6 Suite 1209, Kansas City, Missouri 64111.
- 7 MR. FISCHER: James M. Fischer, Fischer &
- 8 Dority, PC, 101 Madison Street, Suite 400, Jefferson City,
- 9 Missouri 65101, appearing on behalf of Kansas City Power &
- 10 Light Company.
- JUDGE DALE: Are there any others?
- 12 (No response.)
- JUDGE DALE: I know that I have one
- 14 outstanding motion that I will be replying to in writing.
- 15 Other than Mr. Conrad's pending motion, are there any
- 16 other motions outstanding that I should be aware of or is
- 17 there anything else I need to be aware of?
- MS. WHEELER: We would like to enter the
- 19 appearance of Diana C. Carter of the law firm Brydon,
- 20 Swearengen & England, 312 East Capitol, Jefferson City,
- 21 Missouri 65102. She was not able to be here this morning
- 22 due to the hail at her home, and she's appearing on behalf
- 23 of Aquila, Inc.
- JUDGE DALE: Is she the person that I --
- 25 there was some -- I'm sorry to say, but I cannot remember

- 1 who called and asked to be excused, but there is one other
- 2 person who called me last week and asked to be excused. I
- 3 told her she could be excused, but she was at your mercy.
- 4 And I'm sorry, I can't remember who that was.
- 5 All right. Then your task here today, as
- 6 you all know very well, is to come up with a proposed
- 7 procedural schedule. You all know my marching orders as
- 8 far as what will be an acceptable procedural schedule to
- 9 the Commissioners. If you come up with a consensus
- 10 document that meets their requirements, that would be the
- 11 wisest course of action. If you do not, I'll pick one
- 12 that does.
- MR. CONRAD: Why don't you tell us what
- 14 your marching orders are?
- 15 JUDGE DALE: My marching orders are that
- 16 there will be prehearing briefs, limited post-hearing
- 17 briefs. If you're going to settle it and you have any
- 18 partial settlement, then whatever is scheduled to be heard
- 19 that is not settled in writing will be heard on the date
- 20 it is scheduled to be heard.
- 21 If you have a nonunanimous stipulation and
- 22 agreement to which no one has objected in a timely fashion
- 23 or to which parties have stated that they have no
- 24 objection, that will be treated as a unanimous stipulation
- 25 and agreement. But even if you unanimously agree to

- 1 suspend the procedural schedule, if you don't have a
- 2 substantive agreement in writing, our instructions are
- 3 that we are not to postpone the hearings.
- 4 So if you can only get partial stips, my
- 5 recommendation to you would be to work on those issues
- 6 that you have scheduled first or to schedule first those
- 7 issues you think most likely to settle, because if you
- 8 settle those issues and they're scheduled for those first
- 9 days, then we can postpone the beginning and you can work
- 10 on the further issues. Those are my marching orders.
- 11 MR. CONRAD: Just so the record is clear,
- 12 those are different marching orders than was expressed in
- 13 the suspension order, and you realize that the suspension
- 14 order is subject to an application for rehearing or
- 15 reconsideration at this point?
- JUDGE DALE: The suspension order
- 17 objections will be responded to in writing. I disagree
- 18 that the suspension order is subject to rehearing, but
- 19 that will be -- that will be explained in writing.
- MR. CONRAD: And that will be apparent on
- 21 the record. Thank you.
- 22 JUDGE DALE: Anything else? Then we will
- 23 go off the record.
- 24 WHEREUPON, the recorded portion of the
- 25 prehearing conference was concluded.
