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11	JUDGE RUTH: Let's go on the record.
12	I want to welcome everyone here today. We
13	appreciate your coming out in spite of the dusting of
14	snow. My name is Vicky Ruth and I'm a regulatory law
15	judge with the Missouri Public Service Commission.
16	I'll be conducting today's local public hearing for
17	Kennard Jones, the regulatory law judge actually
18	assigned to this case.
19	The Commission has set this time for a local
20	public hearing in Case No. ER-2004-0034 in which
21	Aquila has requested a general rate increase,
22	specifically Aquila's proposed general rate increase
23	in electric rates, which is designed to produce an
24	annual increase of approximately \$65 million for
25	Aquila Networks - MPS.

1	Before we get comments, I'd like to give a
2	brief description of the Commission and the procedures
3	that will be followed. I will also identify some of
4	the people that are present today.
5	The Missouri Public Service Commission is a
6	state agency which regulates the rates charged by
7	investor-owned utility companies in Missouri to ensure
8	that those rates are just and reasonable. The
9	Commission also regulates the quality of service and
10	safety of the operations of the investor-owned
11	utilities. The Commission consists of five
12	commissioners who are appointed by the Governor, and
13	two of the commissioners are present today. We have
14	Commissioner Kelvin Simmons to my left and
15	Commissioner Robert Clayton to my right.
16	The Commission employs a staff of engineers,
17	accountants, attorneys, financial analysts, and other
18	specialists in the field of utility regulation. They
19	have several of those members here today.
20	Warren Wood, raise your hand.
21	And I thought we had another. Greg Potuck
22	towards the back. Thank you.
23	Then beside Mr. Wood from the Office of Public
24	Counsel is Doug Micheel. Next to him is Bruce Bates,
25	the attorney for the Commission.

L	At this table we have Mr. Paul Boudreau, the
2	attorney for Aquila, and sitting to my left, just for
3	the record, is Stanley Williams, who is Vice President
1	of Regulatory Services of Aquila. There are other
5	members of Aquila here, including Mr. Green, who is
5	the CEO.

The purpose of today's hearing is to give the public an opportunity to offer comments or suggestions regarding Aquila's proposed rate increase. This is an official hearing of the Missouri Public Service Commission and the statements and testimony of witnesses will be recorded by the court reporter and must be given under oath or affirmation. All of the commissioners will have an opportunity to read that record or transcript of today's proceeding.

In addition to the local public hearing today, there was a local public hearing held last night in St. Joseph, Missouri, and a trial-type evidentiary hearing will be held in this case in late February and early March in the Jefferson City offices. It is at that hearing that the company, Aquila, will have the obligation of proving its case and parties on both sides of the issue will offer witnesses that will testify.

At today's hearing the company will not have

1	an opportunity to present witnesses and actually
2	answer questions. There was a question-and-answer
3	session before the on-record presentation and the
4	company, OPC, and staff will be available after the
5	hearing for a few minutes to answer questions if some
6	other questions arise.
7	Our procedure will be as follows. I will call
8	the names of the people that have signed up to speak.
9	They will come up to the podium and I will ask them a
10	few preliminary questions, such as their address.
11	Then they can offer their statement and then we may
12	have some questions from either commissioners or the
13	attorneys from the various parties. When the
14	questions are finished, I will excuse the witness and
15	will continue to listen until everyone who wants to
16	speak has an opportunity to do so.
17	Does anyone have a question about the actual
18	procedure?
19	Commissioner Simmons, do you have any opening
20	remarks?
21	COMMISSIONER SIMMONS: Thank you, Judge.
22	I again want to reiterate what you already
23	said, which is we appreciate you being here today. I
24	know that I bring greetings from the other
25	commissioners and the other commissioners will also

Ţ	nave an opportunity to read the transcript of today,
2	so as the judge has already said, there are five of us
3	and two of us are already over in St. Louis at this
4	particular time in another hearing format, but we
5	again appreciate your presence. You could have been
6	anywhere today, you decided to come here, and we want
7	to acknowledge your presence and say thank you and we
8	look forward to hearing from you this afternoon.
9	Thanks.
10	JUDGE RUTH: Commissioner Clayton?
11	COMMISSIONER CLAYTON: I just want to also say
12	thanks for those who came today and also the wonderful
13	weather that you allowed for us. This is the first
14	snow I've seen this year and it's actually refreshing,
15	although a little wet. I appreciate you coming out
16	today. This is important and all of the commissioners
17	will take part in this hearing by reviewing the
18	transcript afterwards. We look forward to your
19	comments.
20	JUDGE RUTH: Thank you. Counsel, let's do
21	entries on the record.
22	MR. BOUDREAU: Let the record reflect I am
23	Paul Boudreau of the law firm of Brydon, Swearengen &
24	England, P.O. Box 456, Jefferson City, appearing on
25	behalf of Aquila, Inc.

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1	MR. WILSON: Yes, I am.
2	JUDGE RUTH: Residential customer or business?
3	MR. WILSON: Both.
4	JUDGE RUTH: And are you here today on behalf
5	of both your residential and your business customer
6	roles?
7	MR. WILSON: Yes, I would say so.
8	JUDGE RUTH: You may proceed with your
9	statement.
10	MR. WILSON: Well, I'm an attorney in downtown
11	Raytown, I also live in the Aquila service area in
12	Raytown, and I would like to thank you for this
13	opportunity to let me address you here today.
14	I've never been to one of these hearings.
15	Frankly, I've never felt the need to come to one of
16	these hearings, but I feel that the Aquila situation
17	at least requires some attention.
18	Over the last year or so, we've just been
19	keeping a record of all of the newspaper clippings
20	about Aquila, none of which have been very flattering,
21	and pretty much everything I knowas Will Rogers used
22	to say, "The only thing I know is what I read in the
23	newspaper," and concerning this, the only thing I know
24	is what I have read in The Kansas City Star.
25	I originally thought about addressing issues

1	such as bonuses, severance packages, and other related
2	issues, but I feel like those are pretty commonly
3	known and maybe have been beaten to death. Comments I
4	will make about those would be in May of 2001 I
5	believe Aquila's stock was at \$37.55, within less than
6	two years it had gotten down at least as low as \$1.24,
7	and throughout this period of time they seem to be
8	paying, I believe, \$30 million in bonuses in 2002.

They gave a severance package to a CEO that had been there nine months as a CEO of \$7.6 million, I believe, and then for the year 2001 they show a loss of almost \$2.1 billion, which is the largest ever, according to The Star, for any Kansas City publicly held corporation.

One area that sort of disturbed me was from the newspaper around November of 2002. This was concerning certain contracts that Aquila had entered into, natural gas contracts, and I believe these were guaranteed or ensured by the Chubb Corporation and that's how they came to light. Aquila apparently entered into natural gas contracts that were prepaid to Aquila. They took the money, according to The Star, and invested it in other companies. At least part of the investment failed, the article wasn't clear on how much of it, and Aquila had to write off

those investments. They later said that they had made
provisions to pay for and deliver the gas on the
contracts that extend up to 2012 and that they had
made provisions to pay for those out of the company's
future cash flow.

It's my understanding that they are trying to end the dual function of the company. They're going to stay with the regulated utility side and they're going to get out of the energy trading side, and if they're getting out of the energy trading side and they're only going to have regulated utilities, what future cash flow is there going to be that is going to be paying for these natural gas contracts that they were already paid for and no longer have the money to provide the natural gas?

I don't want it to be out of the regulated utility side because that's the side that we pay gas bills on. I don't think that if the energy trading had been a tremendous drop that the regulated utilities would benefit from it and I certainly, when this investment goes south, I certainly don't feel like the regulated utility customers should have to pay, should have to pay any of the losses that they had on the energy trading side.

25 If we didn't benefit, I don't think that we

1	should share the losses, and I don't know what other
2	similar losses they've had on the energy trading side
3	are. Frankly, I'm not privy to company information.
4	But I would just ask that the Commission be
5	very scrutinizing as far as making sure that the
6	utility customers only pay for utility expenses and
7	that if there are any other losses that were incurred
8	in any other areas, whatever they may be, that those
9	losses get paid from some other source, such as
10	shareholders or the sale of other assets.
11	And that's basically those are the concerns
12	that I've had and I thank you for your time.
13	JUDGE RUTH: Remain at the podium just for a
14	moment, please.
15	Commissioner Simmons, do you have any
16	questions?
17	COMMISSIONER SIMMONS: I do.
18	Thank you for your testimony. We appreciate
19	you being here. I just want to ask you a few
20	questions because I understand from your testimony
21	that you have both a residence and also a business
22	here in the Aquila service territory. Do you have any
23	issues as it relates to the delivery of service or
24	have you received your service? Any issues in terms
25	of customer service? Have you ever tried to, I guess

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contact Aquila and things like that? I'm just curious
         about your overall service with both your business or
 3
         your residence.
                 MR. WILSON: Well, it wasn't very good in
         February of 2002 when we had the ice storm, but other
 5
 6
         than that, I don't have any problems with their
         service. It always seems to-- The electricity always
 8
         seems to be there. Hardly any outages. I can't even
         recall the last one other than February 28,
 9
         approximately, of 2002. So, yes, they seem to be
10

         delivering the product, to my way of thinking, very
12
         well.
                 I do, however, think that the--I believe a
13
14
         19 percent rate increase seems to be kind of high,
15
         especially considering the other, the rate of
16
         inflation and other factors that I'm aware of.
         would certainly ask the Commission to scrutinize that
17

         19 percent extremely carefully and make sure whatever
19
         increase they get is totally related to regulatory
20
         utility losses.

2	MR. PETRIE: My name is Jim Petrie, last name
3	P-e-t-r-i-e, and I have a business located at
4	6119 Blue Ridge Boulevard in downtown Raytown, which
5	is within the Aquila service area.
6	I would agree with Mr. Wilson's remarks that
7	it appears to be some poor decisions that were made by
8	management, particularly with regard to energy trading
9	decisions and with respect to the awarding of large
L 0	bonuses and severance packages, and the ratepayers
L1	were not party to those decisions, and I would agree
L2	with Mr. Wilson that the ratepayers should not be
L3	responsible for the losses that were incurred as a
L 4	result of those decisions.
L5	Had the ratepayers been privy to those
L 6	decisions, perhaps I'd feel differently, but since
L7	they weren't, I believe that the corporation and its
L8	officers, directors, and shareholders are the ones who
L 9	bear the responsibility, should bear the loss, if
20	there is any.
21	Again, I don't know all the inner workings and
22	the bottom line of Aquila, but I don't believe that
23	the ratepayers should be responsible for the losses
24	that have caused the unprofitability of this venture.
25	That is Aquila's to suffer.

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Other than that, I have nothing to add.

14	thing over and over. Thank you for coming out today.
15	JUDGE RUTH: We appreciate your attendance and
16	I'll remind you that staff, public counsel, and the
17	company, Aquila, will have representatives available
18	for a few minutes to answer any questions that you
19	might still have, and this hearing is now adjourned.
