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1	PROCEEDINGS
2	BY JUDGE THOMPSON: Good evening.
3	We are here in the matter of tariff filing of
4	the Empire District Electric Company to
5	implement a general rate increase for retail
6	electric service provided to customers in its
7	Missouri service area. This is Case Number
8	ER20040570. At this time we will take oral
9	entries of appearance from counsel. Why
10	don't we begin with counsel for the Company.
11	BY MR. BOUDREAU: Thank you. Let
12	the record reflect the appearance of Paul A.
13	Boudreau of the firm Brydon, Swearengen &
14	England, Post Office Box 456, Jefferson City,
15	Missouri, on behalf of the applicant, the
16	Empire District Electric Company.
17	BY JUDGE THOMPSON: Thank you, Mr.
18	Boudreau. Mr. Conrad.
19	BY MR. CONRAD: Your Honor, please.
20	Stuart Conrad, Finnegan, Conrad & Peterson,
21	Kansas City, on behalf of Intervenor Praxair
22	(ph.), and Explorer 5.1.
23	BY JUDGE THOMPSON: Thank you, sir.
24	Public Counsel.
25	BY MR. COFFMAN: Appearing on behalf

1 of the Office of the Public Counsel, the rate 2 paying public, John Coffman, Box 2230, 3 Jefferson City, Missouri 65102. BY JUDGE THOMPSON: Thank you, Mr. 4 5 Coffman. Do we have counsel in Jefferson 6 City? 7 BY MS. WESTON: Yes. Mary Weston, 8 appearing on behalf of the Staff of the 9 Missouri Public Service Commission. Μv 10 address is P.O. Box 360, Jefferson City, 11 Missouri 65102. 12 BY JUDGE THOMPSON: Thank you very 13 Is there any other counsel in much. 14 Jefferson City. Apparently not. Turning to 15 the witness list I see that the first witness 16 is Steven Tollette, if I'm pronouncing that 17 correctly, and please correct me if I'm not. 18 Would you step up to the microphone, sir. 19 (WITNESS SWORN) 20 STEVEN TOLLETTE 21 Having been first dully sworn and examined, testified as follows: 22 23 BY JUDGE THOMPSON: State your name, 24 please. BY STEVEN TOLLETTE: My name is 25

1 Steven Tollette. 2 BY JUDGE THOMPSON: And are you 3 presently a customer of Empire District 4 Electric Company? 5 BY STEVEN TOLLETTE: I represent a 6 company that is. 7 BY JUDGE THOMPSON: That is your interest in this proceeding? 8 9 BY STEVEN TOLLETTE: Yes, it is. BY JUDGE THOMPSON: Go ahead and 10 11 make your statement, sir. 12 BY STEVEN TOLLETTE: I have some 13 maps. 14 BY JUDGE THOMPSON: Why don't you 15 bring those around. Thank you. I have 16 several copies of what is a single map, is 17 that correct? 18 BY STEVEN TOLLETTE: Yes, it is. 19 BY JUDGE THOMPSON: And how would 20 you describe this? 21 BY STEVEN TOLLETTE: It's our route 22 maps for Explorer Pipeline. 23 BY JUDGE THOMPSON: Okay. We'll go 24 ahead and mark this as Exhibit Number #1. 25 Please proceed.

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1	BY STEVEN TOLLETTE: I'm Steve
2	
	Tollette, chief electrical engineer for
3	Explorer Pipeline Company. Our corporate
4	offices are located at 6846 South Canton,
5	Suite 300, Tulsa, Oklahoma. The zip is
6	74136. Explorer Pipeline Company operates a
7	one thousand, four hundred mile pipeline
8	system that transports gasoline, diesel fuel,
9	and jet fuel from the Gulf Coast to the
10	Midwest, facilities in Louisiana, Texas,
11	Oklahoma, Missouri, Illinois and Indiana.
12	Explorer is based in Tulsa, Oklahoma, and
13	also serves Houston, Dallas, Fort Worth, St.
14	Louis and Chicago. Through connections with
15	other pipeline, product pipelines, Explorer
16	serves more than seventy major population
17	centers in sixteen states. We have major
18	takage and terminal facilities at Fort
19	Arthur, Texas, Greenville, Texas, Grapevine,
20	Texas, Glenocal, Oklahoma, Woodbear,
21	Illinois, and Hammond, Indiana. There are
22	presently twenty-six pumping stations located
23	throughout our system, for a total of thirty-
24	two major facilities. Explorer has seven
25	pump stations in Missouri, and three of these

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pump stations are served by the Empire 1 2 District Electric Company. They are our 3 Joplin station, our Mt. Vernon station, and our Springfield station. The pipeline is 4 5 twenty-eight inches in diameter from Fort 6 Arthur, Texas to Tulsa, and twenty-four 7 inches in diameter from Tulsa to Hammond. 8 With the 2003 capacity expansion it can take 9 as few as eleven days to transport a barrel of product from the Gulf Coast to Hammond. 10 11 Explorer currently transports refined 12 products with more than seventy-two different 13 product specifications for over sixty 14 different shippers. The Company does not buy 15 or sell petroleum products, we provide a 16 transportation service. Explorer uses 17 electricity to drive electric motors, which 18 in turn drives large cyntrifical (ph.) pumps 19 to move refined products through its pipeline 20 systems. For example, the Joplin and 21 Springfield stations have a four thousand, 22 five hundred horsepower motor. Pardon me. 23 Two four thousand, five hundred horsepower 24 motors each. At the Mt. Vernon station we 25 have a two thousand horsepower motor and a

1 four thousand horsepower motor. That's a 2 total combined load of twenty-four thousand 3 horsepower, or approximately eighteen 4 megawatts just on Empire District Electric 5 System alone. Explorer operates in an 6 extremely competitive environment. The 7 pipeline system is located in a mature area, 8 having only small growth expectations. We 9 compete with other pipelines to move your 10 byproducts into the markets we serve. We 11 also compete with the local refineries that 12 exist in those markets. For example, if a 13 local refinery can offer products at a price 14 that is lower than it would cost to buy the 15 product in the Gulf Coast and move it up our 16 line, then the market will take the product 17 from the local delivery, the refineries. 18 However, if the local refineries are higher, 19 then the market will buy the product from the 20 Gulf Coast, pay to move it up our line, and 21 the shipper will pay our tariff. Explorer's 22 tariffs are regulated by FIR and market 23 conditions. Explorer has a public's tariff 24 that is the same for all products and for all 25 times of the year. Our tariff includes all

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1 of our expenses, including power costs. 2 Explorer is not allowed to pass through 3 electricity as a separate fuel cost charge, 4 therefore, we have to manage our power costs 5 to remain competitive. When power costs go 6 up we do not automatically get a rate increase. Power costs are Explorer's single 7 8 highest expense. If the Empire District 9 Electric Company's rate is approved as 10 requested, Explorer's power cost is estimated 11 to increase over \$500,000.00 a year. Let me 12 repeat, over \$500,000.00 a year, just from the three stations served by Empire District 13 14 Electric Company. This increase in power 15 cost will make Explorer less competitive, and 16 will make it harder to justify any future 17 expansions. Explorer has intervened in the 18 Empire District Electric Company's rate case 19 so that we may provide our perspective on the 20 rate increase requested so that all parties 21 can agree on what a reasonable cost base 22 power cost should be. 23 BY JUDGE THOMPSON: Does that 24 conclude your statement, sir? 25 BY STEVEN TOLLETTE: Yes, it does.

1 BY JUDGE THOMPSON: Are there any 2 questions from the bench? Commissioner 3 Murray? BY COMMISSIONER MURRAY: 4 Thank you. 5 Are you presently facing any potential power 6 cost increases in the other states that you 7 operate in? 8 BY STEVEN TOLLETTE: There are rate 9 cases in Oklahoma with the Public Service 10 Company of Oklahoma, and with the Oklahoma 11 Gas & Electric Company. Yes. 12 BY COMMISSIONER MURRAY: And how do 13 those rate increases compare to this one if 14 this full amount were granted? 15 BY STEVEN TOLLETTE: I don't know 16 exactly what percentage their rate increases 17 would be in comparison to this to be able to 18 answer that question. 19 BY COMMISSIONER MURRAY: Do you 20 anticipate any other rate cases being filed 21 in the other states? 22 BY STEVEN TOLLETTE: In Texas we 23 have customer choice, and so we go out and 24 competitively bid those stations, so I don't 25 know of any rate cases in Texas that you

would see, and as far as I'm aware there's no 1 2 rate cases pending in Illinois or Indiana. 3 BY COMMISSIONER MURRAY: In Texas 4 are your costs of power rising? 5 BY STEVEN TOLLETTE: The cost of power in Texas fluctuates more with the 6 7 market price than in other areas. The market 8 price of gas in other areas. 9 BY COMMISSIONER MURRAY: And is that 10 trend rising? BY STEVEN TOLLETTE: It is in the 11 12 short term. We expect it to be because the 13 fuel costs have gone up, but we are expecting 14 that those costs will be coming back down. 15 The prediction is the - at least that I saw 16 today, was that the prediction is fuel costs, 17 or gas costs will be coming down in 2005 and 18 2006. 19 BY COMMISSIONER MURRAY: Thank you. 20 BY STEVEN TOLLETTE: You're welcome. 21 BY JUDGE THOMPSON: Thank you, 22 Commissioner. Commissioner Clayton. 23 BY COMMISSIONER CLAYTON: Thank you, 24 Judge. I just have a few questions. First 25 of all, I wanted to ask a question of

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1 clarification of the witness, the dollar 2 amount that he suggested, \$500,000.00 a year. 3 That is based on Empire receiving the entire increase that they have requested? 4 5 BY STEVEN TOLLETTE: Yes, sir, that 6 is correct. 7 BY COMMISSIONER CLAYTON: Okay. And 8 that's an annual cost? 9 BY STEVEN TOLLETTE: Yes, sir. That 10 would be an annual raise for all three 11 stations. 12 BY COMMISSIONER CLAYTON: Is it per 13 station or all three total? BY STEVEN TOLLETTE: 14 No. It's a 15 cumulative for all three. 16 BY COMMISSIONER CLAYTON: Okay. You 17 suggested that the pipeline business is 18 competitive, and I wanted to ask if your 19 competitors are subject to the same potential 20 increase in power cost that you would be, or 21 are they in other jurisdictions? 22 BY STEVEN TOLLETTE: Well, some of 23 them may be in this area, but the majority of 24 them are in other parts of the country, or 25 other electric providers.

1 BY COMMISSIONER CLAYTON: Well, I'm 2 talking about that would be able to service 3 this part of the state of Missouri. 4 BY STEVEN TOLLETTE: I'm sorry, I 5 can't answer that question because I am not familiar. 6 7 BY COMMISSIONER CLAYTON: Okay. My 8 other question is, is Empire a customer of 9 the pipeline, or does it receive gas from a 10 pipeline? 11 BY STEVEN TOLLETTE: We only 12 purchase electricity. We don't buy any gas. 13 All of our movers are electric pumps. 14 BY COMMISSIONER CLAYTON: Okay. 15 BY JUDGE THOMPSON: I think the 16 Commissioner's question --17 BY COMMISSIONER CLAYTON: Do you 18 know if Empire gets any gas from your 19 facility? 20 BY STEVEN TOLLETTE: I'm sorry? 21 BY JUDGE THOMPSON: I think the 22 earlier question was whether you sell 23 anything to Empire. 24 BY STEVEN TOLLETTE: No. We don't 25 sell anything to them. Like I said, we only

1 provide the transportation service, moving 2 refined products, so we don't sell Empire 3 anything. BY COMMISSIONER CLAYTON: 4 Actually, 5 the question was whether or not any of the 6 gas that you provide transportation services 7 for actually is used by Empire, is my 8 question. 9 BY STEVEN TOLLETTE: Well, we 10 actually move refined products. We move 11 qasolines and diesel fuels and jet fuels. We don't --12 13 BY COMMISSIOBNER CLAYTON: So you 14 don't transport gas, you just transport 15 refined products. Okay. Thank you. Are you 16 satisfied with the electrical service that 17 you're receiving from Empire? 18 BY STEVEN TOLLETTE: The reliability 19 is fairly high. 20 BY COMMISSIONER CLAYTON: Is that a 21 yes or no? 22 BY STEVEN TOLLETTE: Well, I think 23 there are some areas that we can improve on. 24 I think there are some areas that --25 BY COMMISSIONER CLAYTON: What areas

1 would you like to see improvement on? 2 BY STEVEN TOLLETTE: Well, where we 3 are, where we are we tend to be out on the 4 end of their systems, we're out on the end of 5 the line that has been extended, and sometimes we do lose service out there, or we 6 7 see voltage dips and things, so we do tend to 8 - as those situations occur, we do try to 9 work those out with Empire District. 10 BY COMMISSIONER CLAYTON: Are there 11 any other problems that need to be dealt with 12 by Empire relating to problems in reliability 13 or any other type - any other areas of the 14 service being provided? 15 BY STEVEN TOLLETTE: The only other 16 area that I can think of would be the way the 17 billing is handled. We get fifteen days to 18 pay the bill, but because - but if they mail 19 it to me it takes up to ten days for me to 20 receive the bill, so that leaves me five days 21 to turn it around, to get them a payment. So 22 that area is an area of difficulty, and not 23 be subject to a late pay and penalty, which 24 is significant. 25 BY COMMISSIONER CLAYTON: Thank you.

1 BY STEVEN TOLLETTE: Thank you. 2 BY JUDGE THOMPSON: Thank you, 3 Commissioner. Commissioner Davis? BY COMMISSIONER DAVIS: No questions 4 5 of this witness. 6 BY JUDGE THOMPSON: Thank you, sir. 7 Questions from counsel? BY MR. BOUDREAU: Yes. Just a 8 9 couple, if I may. 10 BY JUDGE THOMPSON: Mr. Boudreau. 11 BY MR. BOUDREAU: Sir, you said 12 earlier in your comments that your company 13 was an intervenor in this case? 14 BY STEVEN TOLLETTE: Yes, sir, we 15 are. 16 BY MR. BOUDREAU: Did you or anybody 17 else file testimony on behalf of your 18 company, --19 BY STEVEN TOLLETTE: No. 20 BY MR. BOUDREAU: -- pre-file 21 testimony? 22 BY STEVEN TOLLETTE: I have not 23 personally filed any testimony. 24 BY MR. BOUDREAU: Okay. Do you know 25 whether anybody else for Explorer Pipeline

1 filed any pre --2 BY STEVEN TOLLETTE: No one else 3 from Explorer Pipeline has filed testimony. 4 BY MR. BOUDREAU: And I realize that 5 you were answering questions from the 6 Commissioner about voltage fluctuations and 7 billing issues, but those were not issues 8 that have been raised in any pre-filed test 9 on behalf of your company are they? 10 BY STEVEN TOLLETTE: That is 11 correct. 12 BY MR. BOUDREAU: Thank you. That's 13 all the questions I have. 14 BY JUDGE THOMPSON: Thank you, Mr. 15 Boudreau. Any other questions from counsel? Mr. Conrad? 16 17 BY MR. CONRAD: Judge, just by your 18 lead, and just to flush out the foundation 19 for that exhibit, --20 BY JUDGE THOMPSON: Yes, sir. 21 BY MR. CONRAD: -- I might ask Mr. 22 Tollette if he had - I'm referring to Exhibit 23 #1. Did you bring that with you today, Mr. Tollette? 24 25 BY STEVEN TOLLETTE: Yes, sir.

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1 Brought it with me today. 2 BY MR. CONRAD: And did you prepare 3 or cause it to be prepared under your 4 direction or supervision? 5 BY STEVEN TOLLETTE: No. It was a 6 standard document that we have available. 7 BY MR. CONRAD: Does it accurately 8 and truthfully reflect the layout of your 9 pipeline through the states indicated? 10 BY STEVEN TOLLETTE: Yes, it does. 11 BY MR. CONRAD: Your Honor, with 12 that I would respectfully move admission of 13 Exhibit #1. We did not have enough copies to 14 give to counsel, so you may want to defer 15 ruling until we have provided it to counsel. 16 BY JUDGE THOMPSON: Thank you, Mr. 17 Why don't I give counsel an Conrad. 18 opportunity to look at the offered exhibit if 19 you would like. Exhibit #1 has been offered. 20 Do I hear any objections to the receipt of 21 Exhibit Number #1? Mr. Boudreau? 22 BY MR. BOUDREAU: You know, I 23 believe I'm going to lodge an objection, not 24 so much on the fact that I think that the map 25 purports to represent anything that is

1	inaccurate, but I'm a little disturbed by the
2	fact that the parties of the case, that
3	hasn't filed any pre-filed testimony in
4	accordance with the procedural schedule, is
5	here at the local hearing basically offering
6	direct testimony and exhibits. I have some
7	concerns about the procedure that's been
8	employed here, when all of the other parties
9	have filed it, and the company has had a
10	chance to rebut some of the evidence. So I
11	think with that I would lodge an objection to
12	the exhibit.
13	BY JUDGE THOMPSON: Okay. We seem
14	to have lost our video here. And with
15	respect to your objection
16	BY MR. BOUDREAU: Well, if I could
17	do this, I would ask that the Commission
18	reserve ruling on the admission of the
19	exhibit. I'm not the lead counsel in this
20	case, and I think that it's a call that ought
21	to be made by lead counsel and not me. So
22	what I would ask the Commission to do is to
23	reserve ruling on the admission of this,
24	perhaps as an item that can be taken up at
25	the time of the evidentiary hearing, and at

1 that time we may or may not have an 2 objection. 3 BY JUDGE THOMPSON: Okay. 4 BY MR. BOUDREAU: I just have some 5 concerns about the procedure that's been employed, and I'll let - with counsels' 6 7 indulgence, let my partner have to deal with 8 this, because frankly, he's the lead counsel 9 in the case. 10 BY MR. CONRAD: That's fine with us, 11 Your Honor. 12 BY JUDGE THOMPSON: Very well. 13 We'll go ahead and reserve ruling on the 14 acceptance of Exhibit #1. And I believe with 15 no further --16 BY MR. BOUDREAU: Is it okay if I 17 keep this? BY JUDGE THOMPSON: Go ahead. 18 We can make other copies for the folks who need 19 20 You may go ahead and step down, sir. them. 21 Thank you very much for your testimony. 22 BY STEVEN TOLLETTE: Thank you. 23 Appreciate your time. 24 BY JUDGE THOMPSON: We're having 25 some difficulty with the video portion. Why

1	don't we recess briefly while we get the
2	communications link reestablished. So we
3	will be in recess for approximately five
4	minutes. Thank you.
5	(OFF THE RECORD)
6	(BACK ON THE RECORD)
7	BY JUDGE THOMPSON: We'll go back on
8	the record then. Ladies and gentlemen, if
9	you could take your seats. The next witness
10	I have here is Richard J. Bourne. Richard J.
11	Bourne. We'll come back to him. How about
12	Mel Walbridge? Thank you.
13	(Witness Sworn)
14	
15	MEL WALBRIDGE
16	Having been first duly sworn and examined,
17	testified as follows:
18	BY JUDGE THOMPSON: And your name
19	is Mel Walbridge?
20	BY MEL WALBRIDGE: Mel Walbridge.
21	BY JUDGE THOMPSON: And are you
22	presently a customer of Empire District
23	Electric Company?
24	BY MEL WALBRIDGE: Yes, I am.
25	BY JUDGE THOMPSON: Do you have a

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1 statement you would like to make? 2 BY MEL WALBRIDGE: Yes. 3 BY JUDGE THOMPSON: Go ahead, sir. 4 BY MEL WALBRIDGE: Thank you. Ι 5 just want to say that as a retired member of 6 a former utility - or of the gas utility we 7 would like to see economical rates as 8 possible, we like to see good service, we 9 also would like to see that the stockholders 10 are considered in the rate case, because if 11 you don't have good stockholders you can't 12 have a good company, and that's basically 13 about it. JUDGE THOMPSON: 14 ΒY Very well. 15 Questions from the bench for Mr. Walbridge. 16 Commissioner Murray, can you hear us? 17 BY COMMISSIONER MURRAY: I can now, 18 but would Mr. Walbridge please repeat - mind repeating his testimony, because we didn't 19 20 catch more than the first couple of words of 21 it here. 22 BY JUDGE THOMPSON: Very well. 23 BY MEL WALBRIDGE: I'm a retired gas 24 company employee, and I'm concerned that we 25 have good rates, reasonable rates, we have

1 good service, and at the same time that the 2 stockholders be considered because if you 3 don't have good stockholders you don't have a 4 good company. And that's basically it. 5 BY JUDGE THOMPSON: Thank you, Mr. 6 Walbridge. Commissioner, questions? 7 BY COMMISSIONER MURRAY: I don't 8 believe so. Thank you. 9 ΒY JUDGE THOMPSON: Thank you. 10 Commissioner Clayton? BY COMMISSIONER CLAYTON: I want to 11 12 thank Mr. Walbridge for coming, and I'm not 13 sure if you all can see me or not. Can you all see us? 14 15 BY JUDGE THOMPSON: Yes, sir. 16 BY COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Yes. 17 BY COMMISSIONER CLAYTON: Okay. You can see us. Well, we can't see you. We can 18 19 hear you. And I wanted to apologize for the 20 technical difficulties we're that facing 21 right now. I can assure you that I'm going 22 to take it out on somebody from our office, 23 but in the meantime, we appreciate you coming 24 tonight. I do want to ask, I know that you 25 suggested that you wanted the most economical

1 rates as possible, and you're happy with your 2 service. Are you generally in support of the company in terms of their rate increase, or a 3 4 partial rate increase? Do you believe that 5 some rate increase could be justified? MEL WALBRIDGE: You have 6 ΒY to 7 operate at a profit or you can't do business, 8 and therefore, if they're not making a profit 9 then they need a rate increase. BY COMMISSIONER CLAYTON: May I ask 10 11 you, Mr. Walbridge, what gas utility did you 12 work for, if you don't mind saying. And if 13 you would rather not say don't --14 ΒY MEL WALBRIDGE: Missouri Gas Energy now. When I worked for them it was 15 16 KPL Gas Service, or the Gas Service Company. BY COMMISSIONER CLAYTON: Okay. 17 And 18 which community did you say that you lived 19 in? 20 BY MEL WALBRIDGE: Joplin. 21 BY COMMISSIONER CLAYTON: Okay. Mr. 22 Walbridge, thank you very much for coming. I 23 have no further questions. 24 ΒY JUDGE THOMPSON: Thank you, 25 Commissioner. Commissioner Davis?

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1 BY COMMISSIONER DAVIS: No 2 questions. 3 BY JUDGE THOMPSON: Counsel? 4 BY MR. BOUDREAU: I have no 5 questions. Thank you. 6 BY JUDGE THOMPSON: Very well. You 7 may step down. Thank you very much, sir. Richard Bourne. 8 9 (Witness Sworn) 10 RICHARD BOURNE Having been first dully sworn and examined, 11 12 testified as follows: 13 BY JUDGE THOMPSON: Your name is 14 Richard Bourne? 15 BY RICHARD BOURNE: Yes, sir. 16 THOMPSON: ΒY JUDGE Are you 17 presently a customer of Empire District 18 Electric Company? 19 BY RICHARD BOURNE: Yes, sir. BY JUDGE THOMPSON: Go ahead and 20 21 make your statement. 22 BY RICHARD BOURNE: I've been a 23 customer since 1980, and this last increase I 24 think is a little high. I know that the 25 company has to make a profit, but I think

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1 that \$13.00 is a little too high. I think 2 they should go maybe half. Most companies 3 are run by bean counters, and I think you can 4 check the numbers, I think that that's a 5 little high, \$13.00 is a little high. Wе 6 have a lot of retirees in this area, and I 7 think, you know - I understand the company 8 has to make a profit, but, you know, it seems 9 like every other year they're coming up, they 10 want a rate. The last time I was here the -11 when you guys were here, they were trying to 12 merge, you know, and I thought that was a 13 little high. It just seems like - it's just 14 time - you know, you can't keep jacking -15 keep raising every - you know, where I work I 16 can't get a raise like Empire does. Ι do 17 occasionally get raises, but not like what 18 they want, you know. And I think they've got 19 to realize it's the economy here, you know. So that's all I want to say. 20 21 BY JUDGE THOMPSON: Thank you, Mr. 22 Bourne. 23 BY RICHARD BOURNE: Thank you. 24 JUDGE THOMPSON: Commissioner ΒY 25 Murray, any questions?

1 BY COMMISSIONER MURRAY: No 2 questions. Thank you. 3 BY JUDGÉ THOMPSON: Thank you, 4 Commissioner. Commissioner Clayton? 5 BY COMMISSIONER CLAYTON: I have no 6 questions. I think that bean counter was 7 very loud and clear. 8 BY JUDGE THOMPSON: Thank you, 9 Commissioner. Commissioner Davis? BY COMMISSIONER DAVIS: 10 No 11 questions. 12 BY JUDGE THOMPSON: Questions from 13 counsel? 14 BY MR. BOUDREAU: No thank you. 15 BY JUDGE THOMPSON: Very well. You 16 may step down. Thank you very much for 17 coming tonight, sir. Fred Hively. 18 (Witness Sworn) 19 FRED HIVELY 20 Having been first dully sworn and examined, 21 testified as follows: 22 BY JUDGE THOMPSON: Your name is 23 Fred Hivelv? BY FRED HIVELY: Well, it's actually 24 25 Winfred J., but nobody can say Winfred, so I

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1	go by the name of Fred.
2	BY JUDGE THOMPSON: Okay. And are
3	you presently a customer of Empire District
4	Electric?
5	BY FRED HIVELY: Yes, I am.
6	BY JUDGE THOMPSON: Very well.
7	Please proceed.
8	BY FRED HIVELY: I'm, as I said, a
9	normal residential customer of Empire
10	Electric. I believe a year ago in The Joplin
11	Globe I read that Empire was trying to be
12	merged or bought, they were putting
13	themselves up to be merged or bought by some
14	other company, not a specific company, and as
15	such they were cleaning up their books,
16	trying to make themselves look very good so
17	someone would want to buy them. That's very
18	good. I like that, but I'm on social
19	security. I got a two percent raise, will
20	get a two percent raise this year. They have
21	already raised the medical premiums on social
22	security. That premium raised on my social
23	security will almost wipe out the two percent
24	I get. Then everybody else raises their
25	rates. And, again, we're very idiotic in
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1 what we do, the government, not you people 2 specifically, but this Consumer Price Index 3 is a joke. They do not consider energy, nor 4 do they consider food. They consider cars, furniture, I don't know what else, but 5 6 something that I don't buy but every ten 7 years or so. Cars. So if you put that in 8 your equation, your energy and your food, 9 we're going up probably, I would say six to 10 eight percent a year on the cost of living. 11 I feel sure that part of Empire's problem is 12 the gas increase. The only thing that is 13 bothersome is the fact that when gas prices come down, and they will, the rates won't 14 15 come down. They're there to stay. I don't 16 think anybody has ever gone back from the 17 Missouri Public Service Commission and say, 18 well, you energy costs are down now, so you 19 can give your customers back two or three 20 percent. I don't think that's ever happened. 21 I would like to go off the record and relate 22 a tale that my wife told me. We've been 23 married seven years. This happened guite 24 awhile ago. She worked for the water company 25 for seventeen years. She remembers this

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l	incident particularly because it was so
2	outrageous. The company needed two percent
3	to stay where they were, or maybe a little
4	bit ahead. You wouldn't think they would
5	have the cahonies to do it, but they asked
6	for ten percent. The Public Service
7	Commission did their job and gave them five
8	percent. Everybody was happy. The Public
9	Service Commission was looked upon with great
10	deal of favor because they had halfed that
11	rate increase. The public was gleeful
12	because it had been cut in half. They were
13	really relieved. But the company got five
14	percent, they needed two percent. They got
15	over a hundred percent more than what they
16	really needed. I think you should take a
17	real close look at the figures they're giving
18	you, because they normally ask for about
19	three or four times what they really need.
20	Thank you very much.
21	BY JUDGE THOMPSON: Thank you, Mr.
22	Hively. Questions from the bench.
23	Commissioner Murray?
24	BY COMMISSIONER MURRAY: I have no
25	questions. Thank you.

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1	BY JUDGE THOMPSON: Commissioner
2	Clayton?
3	BY COMMISSIONER CLAYTON: I would
4	ask Mr. Hively - I hope I'm pronouncing it
5	correctly.
6	BY FRED HIVELY: Yes, you are.
7	BY COMMISSIONER CLAYTON: Mr.
8	Hively, could you tell me whether you're
9	happy with the service that you're being
10	provided? Is the service reliable? Is it
11	safe? Do you have blackouts? Are you happy
12	with the service that you're receiving?
13	BY FRED HIVELY: I would say on a
14	scale of one to ten it's about a seven or
15	eight. We do have a transformer that keeps
16	going out. It goes out, oh, probably three
17	or four times a year. They get us back
18	online fairly quickly. It was out last night
19	for three hours. But, you know, you're going
20	to have problems. You've got snow and rain,
21	and I think a limb fell on the line last
22	night, is what I understand happened. But I
23	would say the service is very good really.
24	BY COMMISSIONER CLAYTON: I can't
25	tell from your comments whether your service

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1 going out is a regular occurrence or not. 2 Does it happen quite often, or just every 3 once in awhile? 4 BY FRED HIVELY: I said about three 5 or four times a year. Since we have been 6 there. We've been living in our house about 7 six years now. 8 BY COMMISSIONER CLAYTON: When you 9 call the power company you're satisfied with 10 their timeliness and their response and their 11 attitude to get the problem fixed? I don't - I 12 BY FRED HIVELY: Yes. 13 don't understand why they can't fix it. I 14 can understand the limb, but the transformer, 15 I don't know if it's still giving them 16 problems or not, but for two or three years 17 it just kept going out and going out, and 18 they just couldn't seem to find the problem, 19 but I think that that has been solved really. 20 BY COMMISSIONER CLAYTON: Okav. 21 And, sir, I just want to make sure I was 22 correct. You live in Joplin? 23 BY FRED HIVELY: Yes, I do. 24 BY COMMISSIONER CLAYTON: Thank you 25 very much for coming.

1 BY FRED HIVELY: Thank you. 2 BY JUDGE THOMPSON: Thank you, 3 Commissioner. Commissioner Davis? BY COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Mr. Hively, 4 5 I think in your testimony you made sort of a 6 reference to the cost of natural gas 7 increasing --8 BY FRED HIVELY: Yes. 9 BY COMMISSIONER DAVIS: -- and 10 decreasing. Do you think that we as 11 regulators should use our positions to 12 encourage Empire to find alternative means of 13 obtaining their electricity, something 14 besides using natural gas so much in their 15 production? 16 BY FRED HIVELY: I honestly thought 17 President Carter was going to institute 18 something like that, and nothing has happened over the years. There's no sense in talking 19 20 about alternative sources of energy when 21 nobody will do anything about it. Wind I 22 don't think is the answer. Nuclear power 23 perhaps, but people are afraid of that. I 24 don't know what you could use other than 25 natural gas, unless they did find some way

1	maybe to use diesel, or diesel is probably
2	more expensive than natural gas. I just
3	don't - I have no answer to that really.
4	BY COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Okay. Thank
5	you.
6	BY JUDGE THOMPSON: Thank you,
7	commissioner. Questions from counsel?
8	BY MR. BOUDREAU: No. Thank you.
9	BY JUDGE THOMPSON: Hearing none,
10	you may step down. Thank you, Mr. Hively.
11	That's all the people who have signed up to
12	testify. Is there anyone else who would like
13	to testify? Sir, come forward, please.
14	(witness sworn)
15	DALE BLANCHARD
16	Having been first dully sworn and examined,
17	testified as follows:
18	BY JUDGE THOMPSON: Please state
19	your name.
20	BY DALE BLANCHARD: Dale Blanchard.
21	BY JUDGE THOMPSON: Mr. Blanchard,
22	are you presently a customer of Empire
23	District Electric Company?
24	BY DALE BLANCHARD: I am.
25	BY JUDGE THOMPSON: Very well.

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Please proceed.

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2	BY DALE BLANCHARD: Ladies and
3	gentlemen, my name is Dale Blanchard. I
4	reside at 1 Emerald Drive. I am currently a
5	volunteer for Ozark Trails Counsel as vice-
6	president of learning for life. I would like
7	to testify on behalf of the applicant, the
8	issue at hand, and to their witness, to
9	Empire District Electric Company's good
10	stewardship of its revenues and its
11	commitment to the total wellbeing of the
12	citizens of Southwest Missouri and the
13	region. On November 30th of this year Ozark
14	Trails Counsel, the Boy Scouts of America,
15	serving over eleven thousand youth in
16	southern Missouri, southeast Kansas, will be
17	recognizing and presenting to Empire District
18	Electric Company, and its management teams,
19	with a distinguished citizenship award. This
20	award is presented for making a significant
21	difference to the quality of life in our
22	community, and for truly exemplifying values
23	and character found in the Scout law. Empire
24	District Electric is indeed an outstanding
25	and responsible corporate citizen who

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regularly contributes to the leadership and 1 2 financial support of our communities, and 3 constantly reinvests their resources to 4 enhance the over all quality of life and 5 security in southeast - southwest Missouri and our region. Thank you. 6 7 BY JUDGE THOMPSON: Thank you, Mr. 8 Blanchard. Ouestions from the bench. 9 Commissioner Murray? 10 BY COMMISSIONER MURRAY: No 11 questions. Thank you. 12 BY JUDGE THOMPSON: Commissioner 13 Clayton? BY COMMISSIONER CLAYTON: I have no 14 15 questions. I want to thank Mr. Blanchard for 16 coming and sharing that information. 17 BY JUDGE THOMPSON: Thank you. 18 Commissioner Davis? 19 BY COMMISSIONER DAVIS: No 20 questions. BY JUDGE THOMPSON: Questions from 21 22 counsel? There appear to be none. Mr. 23 Blanchard, thank you very much for coming 24 this evening. You may step down. Is there 25 anyone else who would like to give testimony

1 at this proceeding? Very well. Hearing no 2 further witnesses, there appearing to be none, we will go ahead and go off the record 3 at this time and adjourn this local public 4 5 hearing. Thank you all very much for being here this evening. 6 7 (HEARING CONCLUDED) 8 9
