1	PROCEEDINGS
2	BY JUDGE DALE: The Missouri Public
3	Service Commission has set this time for a
4	local hearing in case number ER20060315 in
5	which the Empire District Electric Company
6	seeks an increase of rates that will increase
7	total revenues by \$29,513,713. The Missouri
8	Public Service Commission regulates the rates
9	charged by investor-owned utility companies
10	in Missouri to ensure that those rates are
11	just and reasonable. The Commission also
12	regulates the quality of service and safety
13	of the operations in investor-owned
14	utilities.
15	The commission is made up of five
16	commissioners, two of whom are here today in
17	Jefferson City. The commissioners are
18	appointed by the governor to fixed terms and
19	confirmed by the Senate. The commissioners
20	employ a staff of engineers, accountants,
21	attorneys, financial analysts and other
22	specialists in the field of utility
23	regulation.

I am Colleen M. Dale. I am a Regulatory Law

Judge for the Missouri Public Service

Commission and I will preside over this

hearing. This is an official hearing of the

Missouri Public Service Commission and the

statements and testimony of witnesses will be

recorded by the court reporter and must be

given under oath. All of the commissioners

will have the opportunity to read all of the

witnesses' remarks.

In addition to this local hearing, and the ones that were held previously, a trial-type evidentiary hearing is scheduled for September 6 through 15, 2006, starting at 10 a.m. at the Commission's offices at the Governor Office Building in Jefferson City, Missouri. That hearing is a public hearing and the company will have the burden at that hearing of proving its case. The parties will present their witnesses for and against the petition at that time.

The purpose of this hearing is to hear from you. The company will not present witnesses and will not answer questions.

This is your opportunity to testify and your remarks will be part of the official record of this case. I will call the name of each

1 witness who has signed up to speak. When 2 your name is called, please come forward and 3 speak clearly. There are plenty of microphones around the room, so we will be able to pick up without having to speak directly into a 5 microphone. Please spell your name for the 7 court reporter, so she can put it in the 8 record correctly. I will ask a few 9 preliminary questions and then there may be 10 questions from the commissioners, from me, or 11 from the counsel present. Please do not 12 leave the witness area until you are excused. 13 We are scheduled to end promptly at 9:00. We ask that you be brief. If a previous 14 15 speaker has already made the points you 16 wanted to make, you may simply state that you 17 agree with what that person said. There may 18 be someone who wishes to testify, but because 19 of religious convictions cannot take an oath. 20 For this reason you will be asked to swear or affirm that your testimony will be the 21 22 truth. 23 Are there any questions about this 24 procedure? Hearing none, then we are here in

10	BY JUDGE DALE: Public counsel?
11	BY MR. MILLS: On behalf of the

TERRELL: Well, at this time, with the higher fuel costs, it's a burden 5 that everyone has to share, I understand 6 7 that. My concerns here are that while the 8 company is being profitable, although it's a 9 six-percent profit rather than their 10 preferred 11-percent profit or more, I think 11 it's premature to be requesting that all 12 these families, many of whom in this area are low-income families, that they should bear 13 the burden alone of these higher fuel costs. 14 15 I don't see any problem with a company 16 losing some of their extra profit due to 17 these costs, since it was - and we don't even

At the same time that the customers, they have to bear their costs as well. If this company was closer to going in the red I would be all for the rate increase, but at this point, since we don't even know that the fuel costs are going to continue at this rate,

OCHOA: I don't see any, Your Honor. 14 BY JUDGE DALE: Mr. Mills, do you 15 16 have an opinion on whether we should wait any 17 longer? 18 BY MR. MILLS: Why don't we give it 19 another five minutes. It's only 6:15. 20 People may have seen the notice and expected the hearing to go on for some time. You 21 22 know, there was another woman here just a few

minutes ago. I'm not sure, I thought she was

perhaps interested in testifying, but she

seems to have left. There may be other

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1	people that come in, so with the Bench's
