2	Morris L. Woodruff, Regulatory Law Judge Chairman Jeff Davis

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- JUDGE WOODRUFF: Let's go ahead and
- 3 get started. I want to welcome everyone here this
- 4 morning. My name is Morris Woodruff. I'm the
- 5 Regulatory Law Judge assigned to this case, and with
- 6 me today on the left here is Chairman Jeff Davis. On
- 7 my right is Commissioner Kevin Gunn. We're expecting
- 8 Commission Robert Clayton who will be joining us here
- 9 in a few minutes. He got tied up in traffic. Let's
- 10 start out today if the Commissioners have any opening
- 11 comments. Commissioner Davis?
- 12 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: I just want to
- 13 say welcome to everyone, and please don't be shy so
- 14 as to testify. These hearings are for you and it's
- 15 meant for you to tell us, you know, about your
- 16 service, you know, and about your rates and ask
- 17 questions and let us know if you do see any problems
- 18 that we need to address. So thank you for coming in
- 19 today and for the hearing.
- JUDGE WOODRUFF: Thank you. And
- 21 Commissioner Gunn?
- 22 COMMISSIONER GUNN: I just want to
- 23 echo the Chairman's comments. So we look forward to
- 24 hearing all you have to say. We'll be here until
- 25 you're finished. So thank you.

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1 JUDGE WOODRUFF: Thank you. At this
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- 2 point I'll ask if there are any of the attorneys for
- 3 any of the parties here so they'll want to enter an
- 4 appearance.
- 5 MS. TATRO: Wendy Tatro, 1901
- 6 Chouteau Avenue, St. Louis, Missouri, here for
- 7 AmerenUE.
- 8 JUDGE WOODRUFF: And for Public
- 9 Counsel?
- 10 MR. LEWIS: On behalf of the Office
- 11 of Public Counsel and the public, my name is Lewis
- 12 Mills. My address is Post Office Box 2230, Jefferson
- 13 City, Missouri.
- JUDGE WOODRUFF: Anyone here from
- 15 staff? Any other parties? All right. Well, as you
- 16 can see we have a court reporter here today taking
- down and transcribing the testimony that will be
- 18 received. Not all of the Commissioners can be here
- 19 today. But the ones that aren't will be able to read
- 20 the transcript and other testimony as we consider the
- 21 case. I want to state we're here to listen to what
- 22 you have to say about the service received from
- 23 Ameren and about the rate increase. The
- 24 Commissioners cannot answer questions today. If you
- 25 have some specific questions about your bill or your

- 1 service you can ask representatives of the staff or
- 2 public counsel from the company. If you'll notice
- 3 there are a whole lot of AmerenUE people out there
- 4 ready to answer your questions. I'm going to ask
- 5 people to come up and testify based on the sign up
- 6 sheet here. Even if you didn't sign up, if you
- 7 decide that you want to testify just let me know and
- 8 I'll call you on up here. I'll swear you in and then
- 9 you can tell the Commissioners what you want to say.
- 10 When we're done the Commissioners may want to ask a
- 11 few follow-up questions. I'll give the attorneys for
- 12 the parties have a chance to -- an opportunity to
- 13 answer questions as well. I'm sorry. Commissioner
- 14 Jarrett is on the web cast. That's him on the screen
- 15 here. Commissioner Jarrett, do you have anything you
- 16 want to say?
- 17 COMMISSION JARRETT: Yes, Judge. I'm
- 18 joining you. Sorry I couldn't be there in person,
- 19 but I'm glad to be able to join you here. So I look
- 20 forward to hearing the testimony.
- JUDGE WOODRUFF: Okay. Well, I'll
- 22 call up the first person on the list, which is
- 23 Julianne Allen. Good afternoon, Ms. Allen. Please
- 24 raise your right hand and I'll swear you in. Do you
- 25 swear or affirm the testimony you are about to give

- 1 today is to be the truth, the whole truth and nothing
- 2 but the truth?
- 3 MS. ALLEN: I do.
- JUDGE WOODRUFF: Thank you very much.
- 5 What would you like to tell us?
- 6 MS. ALLEN: I'm here as a private
- 7 citizen and as a social worker. I get a lot of phone
- 8 calls for people looking for energy assistance. The
- 9 average income -- the average cost of living increase
- 10 for the people who are on Social Security who call
- 11 our office is 2.5 percent. A lot of times these
- 12 people are having to make decisions whether they're
- 13 going to buy prescription drugs, buy food or pay
- 14 utilities. I'm here to speak against the rate
- 15 increase. In the City of St. Louis there are about
- 16 59,026 people who are between the ages of 60 -- or
- 17 who are 60 and over. If you look at the disabled,
- 18 which is probably about 18.4 percent, that number is
- 19 61,977. 17.4 percent people in the City of St. Louis
- 20 is (inaudible). I think the rate increase will cause
- 21 a hardship for many of these people that would serve.
- 22 As a social worker I do a lot of home visits for the
- 23 elderly at this age. I'll give you an example. Last
- 24 summer I went to a client's home that was 81 years
- 25 old. He was homebound in a wheelchair. After I got

- 1 there someone from AmerenUE came out to disconnect
- 2 his electric. He had nobody. He had no place to go.
- 3 I asked him did he have someplace to go, and he said
- 4 he didn't. He owed the company I think he said it
- 5 was \$50. However, he had been paying what he could
- 6 on his utility bill every month. The gentleman that
- 7 I talked to from the company that came out to -- I
- 8 guess it's a separate contractor from AmerenUE said
- 9 he did not have any money. I was going to give the
- 10 man \$50 out of my pocket. It was at the end of the
- 11 month. They could not wait for the first of the
- 12 month for the gentleman to get the \$50 to pay the
- 13 utility bill. A lot of times I see a lot of clients
- 14 like this who are isolated who don't have anybody to
- 15 help them, and usually when they struggle with
- 16 utility bills it's usually at the peak of the heating
- 17 or electric season. So on behalf of those clients,
- 18 I'm just against this rate increase.
- 19 JUDGE WOODRUFF: Thank you. If you
- 20 would wait for a moment for questions. Does AmerenUE
- 21 or Public Counsel have any questions for this
- 22 witness?
- MR. MILLS: I don't have any
- 24 questions. Thank you.
- 25 MS. TATRO: I don't have any

- 1 questions. Could the witness state her address?
- JUDGE WOODRUFF: Okay.
- MS. ALLEN: My address is 1927 Annie
- 4 Malone Drive.
- 5 JUDGE WOODRUFF: Thank you. Chairman
- 6 Davis, do you have any questions?
- 7 CHAIRMAN DAVIS: No questions, ma'am.
- 8 Well, would you tell us tell us what agency you work
- 9 for?
- 10 MS. ALLEN: I work for a city agency.
- 11 CHAIRMAN DAVIS: Okay. That's fine.
- 12 Thank you.
- MS. ALLEN: All right.
- 14 JUDGE WOODRUFF: Mr. Jarrett, do you
- 15 have any questions for this witness?
- 16 COMMISSIONER JARRETT: No questions.
- 17 Thank you for your testimony.
- 18 JUDGE WOODRUFF: Commissioner Gunn?
- 19 COMMISSIONER GUNN: I just have one
- 20 question. How do you think the company does in your
- 21 experience in getting out information about low
- 22 income assistance programs that they may have?
- MS. ALLEN: I don't think they do a
- 24 good job at all because when I talk to people and ask
- 25 them if they know about these programs, they tell me

- 1 that they don't. I know about these programs. What
- 2 I do is I send the application out to these clients
- 3 or I would go to their home to complete the
- 4 application. But I think a lot of times people just
- 5 assume that the public knows about these programs.
- 6 Some of the elderly or some of the disabled they
- 7 have, you know, medical equipment in the homes and
- 8 they aren't aware. It might have a lot to do with
- 9 literacy. But most of the people that I talk to,
- 10 they aren't aware of these programs.
- 11 COMMISSIONER GUNN: How about how the
- 12 company does informing you as a social worker and a
- 13 member of a social service agency in what these
- 14 programs are? Are their materials easy to get
- 15 through?
- MS. ALLEN: For me, yeah. The
- 17 materials usually I'll call because I know where to
- 18 call because I worked with the Energy Assistance
- 19 Program for about five years. So I know what's out
- 20 in the community and what's available. So it's
- 21 always easy for me to make a phone call to get the
- 22 information, and I don't have any trouble with that.
- 23 COMMISSION GUNN: Has the company
- 24 been responsive to you when you have contacted them
- 25 in your capacity as a social service agency?

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1 MS. ALLEN: Yes, they have.
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- 2 COMMISSIONER GUNN: Okay. Great.
- 3 That's all of the questions I have.
- 4 JUDGE WOODRUFF: Well, thank you very
- 5 much for testifying.
- 6 MS. ALLEN: Thank you.
- 7 MR. THOMPSON: Judge?
- JUDGE WOODRUFF: Yes.
- 9 MR. THOMPSON: Kevin Thomas for the
- 10 staff and I would like to enter an appearance for the
- 11 record.
- 12 JUDGE WOODRUFF: Go right ahead, and
- 13 then please speak up and speak clearly. We're having
- 14 a little difficulty hearing.
- MR. THOMPSON: Thank you, Judge.
- 16 Kevin Thompson for the staff of Missouri Public
- 17 Service Commission, Post Office Box 360, Jefferson
- 18 City, Missouri 65101.
- 19 JUDGE WOODRUFF: Thank you,
- 20 Mr. Thompson. Ms. Allen was the only person who
- 21 signed up to be a witness. Is there anyone else in
- 22 the audience that would like to give testimony? I
- 23 don't see any other response. Well, since it is over
- 24 the noon hour and so forth, what we're going to do is
- 25 take about a 15 minute recess and see if anyone else

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1 appears that wants to testify. So at this point
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- 2 we'll take a recess and we'll come back at 12:30.
- 3 (WHEREIN, a brief recess was taken at
- 4 12:16 p.m.)
- JUDGE WOODRUFF: All right. Let's go
- 6 ahead and get started again. We're back from recess.
- 7 It's now 12:35. While we were in recess Commissioner
- 8 Clayton joined us. Commissioner Clayton, do you have
- 9 any questions?
- 10 COMMISSIONER CLAYTON: No. I
- 11 apologize. I just claim to be a victim of the
- 12 Highway 40 reroute and apologize for my tardiness.
- JUDGE WOODRUFF: All right. Has
- 14 anyone else arrived while we were in recess that
- 15 wishes to testify? I don't see any response out
- 16 there. Any of the Commissioners have anything they
- 17 want to add? Commissioner Jarrett?
- 18 COMMISSIONER JARRETT: No.
- 19 JUDGE WOODRUFF: With that then we
- 20 are recessed. Thank you all for coming.
